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## County has highest COVID-19 rate in western Wisconsin

After June began with a day that didn't have any new COVID-19 cases in Trempealeau County, the rest of the week showed a drastic climb with 16 new cases, according to the Trempealeau County Health Department.

Last week was the first week with multiple days in which no new cases were reported since early May, but five new cases were reported on Tuesday after zero on Monday and six came on Friday after zero on Wednesday. There were also two new cases reported last Thursday and three on Sunday, giving the county 42 total cases at the start of this week.

Of the total cases, 23 remain active with 19 having recovered. Eau Claire County also had 23 active cases at the start of this week, while La Crosse County had 21, Jackson County had three and Buffalo County had zero. The Trempealeau County Health Department reported two county residents have been hospitalized because of the virus and the ages of the people to test positive have ranged from under 10 years old to in their 60s.

With 40 of the cases in their system, the Wisconsin Department of Health Services listed the county as having a rate of 135.9 cases

per 100,000 people, the highest rate in western Wisconsin as of Monday. Eau Claire County had a rate of 119.4, Jackson County's was 92.7, La Crosse County was at 58.5 and Buffalo County's rate was 45.6. While Buffalo County has had just six total positive cases, two of the residents have died. Jackson County also had one death, while nobody in Trempealeau, Eau Claire or La Crosse counties have died from COVID-19.

Fifteen of the 40 cases listed on the DHS website have been from the Arcadia area, where 232 people have tested negative, giving Arcadia a positive test rate of 6.1 percent. Those tested in the rest of the county have seen just 1.1 percent of the results come back positive.

While Arcadia still has the most positive tests, two other areas — Whitehall and Galesville — both have five positive tests. There have been 327 negative tests in the Whitehall area and 299 in the Galesville area. The other five sections of the county are all showing fewer than five positive results with a combined 1,190 negative tests.

Just south of Galesville, the northern border of La Crosse County has seen an increase with 13 total positive tests.

## Galesville man arrested for murder released last week

A Galesville man who was arrested on a murder accusation was released without charges last week.


John Rieple was booked into Hennepin County Jail at approximately 2 a.m. on May 28, but was released on June 1 without any charges being filed. The official reason for Rieple's release was because people cannot remain in custody for more than 36 hours without charges being filed.

Rieple was arrested after Calvin Horton Jr. was found

dead of a gunshot wound on the sidewalk of Cadillac Pawn and Jewelry, a store in Minneapolis, Minn., owned by Rieple. Videos showed heavy looting of Rieple's store.

A request for comment from the Times — including information about if Rieple is still considered a suspect in the shooting — was not returned by the Hennepin County District Attorney's office.

Authorities have 90 days to decide if Rieple will be charged.

## 'Why does this keep happening'

Former area man discussed experience with police violence and Minneapolis riots

Pain.

It wasn't his neck that the police officer's knee was on. He wasn't the one who lost his life and he didn't personally know George Floyd. But when Clifford Tyson heard about and saw what happened, he felt it.

"Just so much pain," Tyson said. "Why does this keep happening? What has got to happen for people to recognize that this is real. Cops are killing, and have been killing, black people for over 400 years."

Living in Arcadia for roughly a decade, Tyson was one of the roughly 175 African Americans or 0.6 percent of the population — according to the 2019 Census Bureau — living in Trempealeau County before relocating to Winona, Minn. But Minneapolis is his home. That's where he grew up, it's where he suffered through incidents of police brutality. When he saw what happened to Floyd on Memorial Day, he had to try to fight for change.

"That could've been me," Tyson said. "I was there the Wednesday before."

Tyson said he had been sitting at home on Tuesday evening before telling his fiancé, Theresa Sargeant, that he had to go back to his old neighborhood. He had to be a part of the protest, the fight for justice.

For Tyson, that fight is personal.

"I got marks on my body," Tyson said.

Tyson told the story of how when he was 22 years old he got drugged in a bar. After drinking two beers, he felt the need to go to sleep so he climbed in his car. He was then had an abrupt and violent awakening.

"The cops pulled me out of the car and they beat the \$&!% out of me for nothing," Tyson said. "They didn't ask me what I was doing, didn't ask me if I was all right, they just beat the \$&!% out of me."

When asked for a reasoning, Tyson said the officers claimed he had attacked one of them.

### Arcadia to revisit renting shelters

By Debbie Foss Times Staff Arcadia officials are scheduled to reconsider their previous decision to not rent shelters in city parks this summer because of concerns about COVID-19. The council at its next regular meeting of June 17 will take a second look at whether the shelters can be safely used. The council previously decided against renting shelters this year when it opted to not open the city aquatic center and ended parks and recreation programs for the summer. "We know there has been an increase in cases in the county," said Mayor Rob Reichwein. "But people still need a place to gather outside." The council last Wednesday approved a modified United for A Dream 2020 event on July 18. Luis Cruz told the council that organizers will host a drive-through food event so the endeavor can continue to raise money for scholarships and translators at Arcadia schools. "It's a crazy time," Cruz said. "We don't want to spread the virus. But this money is important for scholarships."

## Trempealeau floodplain ordinance stymied by DNR

By Zac Bellman Times Staff Despite the passing of a bill to eliminate cost prohibitions on improvements to get non-conforming buildings above the floodplain, residents in the village of Trempealeau still cannot move forward under the new law. Wisconsin Act 175 was signed into law on March 3, but due to more restrictive language in the village of Trempealeau's ordinances that does not yet reflect the new law, Act 175 has not yet taken effect in the village. The legislation was drafted to eliminate a "50 percent" rule pertaining to how much as a percentage of the value of the property a homeowner was allowed to spend on modifications to raise the level of the home above the floodplain. Village officials have been working to correct the discrepancy, but their original draft of the amended ordinance did not include specific language addressing the recently passed law, but rather citations. The final hurdle for the Village to approve their ordinance is receiving approval from FEMA, which their ordinance did not have as of last Thursday's public meeting. Village zoning and planning director Roxroy Barrett said he has been in correspondence with FEMA and the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR), but fears a similar obstruction that the village has experienced in previous interactions particularly with the DNR. "(The DNR) have a history of not responding to the village's requests in the past," Barrett said. "They gave me a timeline (once the ordinance is resubmitted) of six to 12 months." Barrett also suggested that Thursday's open meeting of the village board that the DNR may be a greater obstacle than rewriting the ordinance. He expects the rewrite to be completed and ready for consideration prior to July's regular meeting of the village board on July 2. "FEMA wants people to improve their homes, the DNR doesn't want anyone living down in that area," Barrett said. For Deb Ondell, a Trempealeau resident who has been one of many anxiously awaiting the opportunity to raise her home out of harm's way, she said she hopes a resolution is coming soon. "The village of Trempealeau is working very diligently to expedite this process," Ondell said. "Once the lawyer has revised the ordinance, it will go back to FEMA and DNR. Hopefully, they will approve the revision in a timely fashion."

## Trempealeau pool set to open with 50-patron limit

By Zac Bellman Times Staff The Trempealeau municipal pool will open with a 50-patron maximum capacity for open swim on June 14 to residents and village of Trempealeau taxpayers. The announcement came with the release of protocol and guidelines for the 2020 pool season approved at Thursday's regular meeting of the Trempealeau village board. Patrons will be able to gain admittance only with the purchase of a season pass, which will take 24 hours to process after the provision of proof of residency via a utility or other bill. Admittance can be reserved through the website Omnify (getomnify.com), calling the pool office or reserving for their next visit in person at the pool office. Walk-in season pass holders will also be admitted if the facility is not at capacity, though the pool recommends reserving to ensure admittance. Additional safety precautions being taken by the pool include: the availability of masks for \$1, the removal of deck furniture and reminders at regular intervals to maintain social distancing from members of different households on the pool deck and in the pool itself. An extra lifeguard devoted to monitoring social distancing will also be patrolling the pool deck. Patrons will also be allowed and encouraged to bring their own chairs, blankets and towels. Face-masks will be required for employees. Drinking fountains will also be turned off, but bottled water will be available for pool patrons and staff. Regular sanitization protocols will also be employed, and sanitization stations will also be provided at the locker room entrances. Village board-approved protocols also include a plan for phases to increase the availability of admittance in both quantity and surrounding townships. The next step will be to expand admittance to the townships of Trempealeau and Caledonia, with the following step being to expand to the remainder of the Gale-Etrick-Trempealeau School District. No pool admittance will be allowed for non-G-E-T residents or those without a season pass for the duration of the 2020 swimming season.

## G-E-T board closes book on 2019-20

By Zac Bellman Times Staff Monday's meeting of the Gale-Etrick-Trempealeau school board served to close the book on both the 2019-20 school year, and the tenure of their administrator. Aaron Engel, who assumed the role of district administrator at G-E-T on July 1, 2015, oversaw his final regular meeting of the school board Monday night. The board discussed final achievement gap reduction reports for 2019-20, approved a preliminary budget for the 2020-21 school year, approved the hires of three teachers and a new Galesville Elementary School principal before also approving several board policy revisions. Engel took time to reflect at the end of the meeting on some of what he perceived to be the district's biggest accomplishments during his tenure, some of which included: athletic facility upgrades in 2016, the \$9.8 performing arts center project currently under way and a new staff compensation model. "It's been an incredible five years. I think we've done some amazing things in the district in both infrastructure and equity, and I'm proud to have been a part of it," Engel said. Achievement gap reduction reports focused on efforts to adapt to quickly-changing circumstances as the district responded to state orders to combat the spread of COVID-19. Usual tracking data provided by regular in-person assessments was unavailable, so each parent was provided with a narrative summary of their student's trajectory from January until closure on March 18, as well as their progress during crisis learning from March 18 to June 4. The preliminary budget for the 2020-21 school year was largely similar to the 2019-20 budget according to Engel, with minor cuts to staff travel with the anticipated loss of teaching conferences next school year. Engel said the district would likely revise the budget as state aid takes shape this fall. The hires of Melissa Wilber as Galesville Elementary principal, kindergarten teacher Brittany Geary, sixth-grade teacher Jane Hiller and fourth grade teacher Karalyn Zachary were also approved, as were the resignations of Spanish teacher Kelly Pfennig and bus driver Bruce Lehman. Pfennig will retain her role as gymnastics coach, while Lehman is moving out of the district. Christine Sebranek's transfer to third grade at Trempealeau Elementary school from her current role as a second grade teacher was also approved. School board policy changes pertaining to remote participation were also approved, which now allow board members to receive payment for remote participation in board meetings. School board president Gene Hogden concluded the meeting with condolences for the families of former Galesville mayor and Galesville Republican publisher John Graf and former G-E-T administrator Bob Howard, who each passed over the past month.



### ACU Ground Breaking

The Arcadia Credit Union Board of Directors broke ground on an expansion on May 18. "With the addition and remodel, we will be able to increase our staffing to better serve you, our member needs. ### 25 YEARS AGO June 15, 1995

The Whitehall city council has given an unidentified Madison developer six months to come up with a plan to renovate the former city hall building. At its regular monthly meeting Tuesday night, the council voted unanimously to grant an exclusive option to the potential purchaser. The developer has told city officials that he needs the time to formulate a business plan for renovating and developing the 80-year-old building.

Bev Monahan of Galesville is the new Trempealeau County personnel director/administrative assistant, starting her duties last week.

What was billed as an organizational meeting for Trempealeau County residents opposed to a one-half percent county sales tax, ended up being a forum for county board members who enacted the new levy. About 40 people attended the meeting, held last week Tuesday at the county courthouse in Whitehall. But between a half-dozen and 10 of them were county supervisors who used the meeting to defend their support for the tax and explain their reasons for voting for it.

Mary Lou Fernholz has decided to say goodbye to the noble occupation of teaching. She has been a teacher at Arcadia Catholic School for 27 years, but decided to retire so she could spend more time with her family.

During the past year, Miss Arcadia 1994 Allison Ziegeweid has attempted to address the concept of family values and how the deterioration of relationships within the family can have adverse effects on the family unit as a whole. Her pageant platform as she prepared to run for Miss Wisconsin 1995 is based on the idea of strengthening the American family. As a part of her platform, Ziegeweid has created the program "Family Matters."

Young gun Eric Boberg struck out 16 Cochrane-Fountain City batters in Arcadia's 4-1 win.

Wrestling is out as a varsity sport, at least temporarily, at Gale-Ettrick-Trempealeau High School and Rick Schmidt has been named the head varsity boys basketball coach.

Nine money bags containing \$6,200 in cash were taken during a break-in at Barb's Corner Tap, Ettrick, with village police and sheriff's detective following up on leads. "We've got some stuff we're working on. We're talking to people, Dean Bishop, Ettrick police chief, said.

The G-E-T School District is joining forces with a state-wide group that is expecting to file a lawsuit against the state's educational funding

formula on the grounds it isn't equitable. In becoming one of about 170 districts poised to sue the state, the G-E-T district stands to gain "lots of money," said superintendent Bill Zaborowski.

### 50 YEARS AGO June 18, 1970

Pigeon Falls native John Monson has been hired as Whitehall High School principal, replacing Ernest Brickner, who has resigned. Monson has served as elementary principal of the Oil Companies School in Tripoli, Libya, for the past four years.

The Whitehall women's softball team has been reorganized this year under the sponsorship of the Whitehall Lanes and management of Gene McDevitt, and will play in the eight-team area league. Patti Frei had a game-winning grand-slam home run in the team's home opener last week Wednesday.

Marlys Kolstad, daughter of Mrs. Harold Kolstad, Arcadia, was among those who graduated from Fairview Hospital School of Nursing at commencement exercises held at the Central Lutheran Church in Minneapolis, Minn. She will be employed at Community Memorial Hospital in Winona, Minn.

Arthur Hoyt Uhl, holder of Ph.G., B.S. M.S., and Ph.D degrees from the University of Wisconsin, professor of pharmacy and a native of Galesville, was speaker Sunday at Founder's Day observance at Marynook Novitiate, Galesville.

The Trempealeau Board of Education and Trempealeau Teachers' Association have reached an agreement on teacher contracts for the 1970-71 school year. The settlement calls for a Bachelor's range from \$6,850 to \$9,188 in eight steps. The present range is \$6,475 to \$8,679. Teachers with a Master's Degree will begin at \$7,450 and go to \$11,828 in 13 steps. This year's range was \$7,075 to \$11,019. The 30 returning teachers will receive an average increase of 7.9 percent.

A public hearing has been called by CESA Agency 11 at Gale-Ettrick High School. The meeting is to hear arguments for and against the petition signed by Harold Severson and other qualified electors of the Trempealeau School District who are asking that a portion of that district be detached and added to the G-E district.

### 75 YEARS AGO June 14, 1945

The annual Trempealeau County school board convention was held yesterday at the Whitehall High School gymnasium. Entertainment during the daylong program included a piano solo by Miss Beverly Schaefer of Whitehall, and a Scottish song

and dance by the pupils of the Pleasant View school in Preston, under the direction of their teacher, Mrs. Thelma Linnerud.

Two new employees of Trempealeau County arrived Monday to assume their positions. They are the new home demonstration agent, Miss Blanche Padour of Crandall, and Miss Harriet Rhude of Arcadia, who is the new clerk in the pension department, replacing Mrs. Lila Duff.

Following World War I, an honor roll was erected on Main St. in Whitehall near the depot, but after a number of years it yielded to the elements and was taken down. Last month, the Hutchins-Stendahl post engaged Albert Engen to rebuild it, and it was placed on the plot of ground being beautified by the Boy Scouts. It bears 98 names, including five gold stars: Otis Hutchins, Arthur Erickson, Thorvald Kinservik, Oscar Tofto and Raymond Upson.

While trout are not as numerous as they were said to have been back in the early days, occasionally anglers make good catches in the neighboring streams. Friday, Warden Ted Johnson and his young friend, Jimmy De Bow, went out somewhere and brought back 30 speckled trout, 15 each. If they had had more, Warden Ted and Jimmy would have exceeded the limit.

The Whitehall Cubs will open the baseball season at the county seat with a twilight game against Osseo at Melby Park tonight. Osgood and Nehring will be in form to do the battery work for the Cubs, while Sayles and Mickelson is the battery for Osseo.

Pvt. Russell Severson, 19, U.S. Marine Corps, of Arcadia, was one of 250 wounded Marines and sailors who received the Purple Heart at the U.S. Naval Hospital at Great Lakes, Ill. He is the son of Mrs. S.T. Severson of Arcadia.

The city of Arcadia was reported to be short in the

sales of War Bonds with only 10 days remaining before the deadline. The seventh war loan drive required the purchase of \$175,000, the city only had \$140,000.

### 100 YEARS AGO June 17, 1920

The Whitehall village board, at its meeting Monday night, voted to pay the band \$20 a month for summer concerts.

What's the matter with Burleson? A letter post-marked 6 p.m. Tuesday at Trempealeau arrives at Whitehall at noon today.

We venture to say that there is not a businessman in Whitehall who receives the mail that goes daily to one patron on Route 3. Mr. Dake carried 98 letters last Monday, and delivered them to one person on that route. These letters bear postmarks from all over the United States. No one, of course, knows the nature of the correspondence, which evidently is with ladies, as the return cards indicate that the communications are with that sex. One might suspicion that they are of a matrimonial nature, but this theory is dispelled by the fact that the recipient is also a woman.

Mr. Dake says that for some time these letter have been passing through the mail, 10, 15 or 25 at a time, but Monday broke the record.

Mrs. J.E. Rhode returned from Kenosha, the Nash factory, Sunday night with a Nash touring car. Mrs. Rhode made the distance of 350 miles without any trouble.

The Whitehall band will hold regular concerts every two weeks on Saturday nights, and special entertainments on special occasions.

August Dahl of Pigeon is hauling lumber to rebuild his barn, which was destroyed by a recent windstorm. He had insurance for \$1,000, and it will cost \$2,500 to rebuild. No stock was injured, and the horses were fortunately in the pasture at the time. The

## Doerr's push to impact, save lives

Pickup basketball games between Madison and Mitchell Doerr while they were growing up in Trempealeau were competitive, physical affairs.

"Many games were played where there were no fouls allowed to be called, which paid off in the long run," Mitchell explained. "After one of her games during a WSN (Wisconsin Sports Network) Showcase, a collegiate coach asked her if she had an older brother based on the way she was able to take contact and finish."

What started as a friendly sibling rivalry has blossomed into accountability to pursue excellence for 2020 grad and former forward for the Viterbo women's basketball team Madison and current assistant coach for Viterbo women's basketball Mitchell. After completing an internship with the Indiana Pacers' strength and conditioning staff, Mitchell joined the Viterbo staff under Lionel Jones in 2018 while working on a Master's Degree in leadership education - sports management at Winona State University. At the time Madison was entering her junior season at Viterbo, and said being coached by her brother was a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity.

"Having him be there for my teammates and I for every practice and big, nerve-racking game helped put me in the right, competitive mindset. Mitchell added a lot to our program at Viterbo and is very knowledgeable about seeing the game of basketball," Madison said.

Madison's senior campaign this past winter was a successful one for both siblings, as they helped lead the V-Hawks to an 11-win regular season for their highest win total since the 2007-2008 season. Viterbo also tallied an 8-6 record in the North Star Athletic Association (NSAA) for their best conference record since 2004-2005, and advanced to the NSAA's Final Four and Championship Game for the first time in school history. Mitchell credited senior leaders including Madison for fueling the team's recent resurgence.

Both pointed to their Gale-Etrick-Trempealeau roots however for helping them reach new heights in their field. For Mitchell, his own playing days under former G-E-T coach Mark Wagner helped develop the confidence to communicate and lead.

"In regards to translating this into coaching the sport, as any coach, you learn and grow in your ability to teach the more you coach. There

wasn't a single opportunity I turned down," Mitchell said.

One of those opportunities was a chance to start assisting with athlete strength and conditioning while he was still a sophomore at G-E-T, which is where he caught the coaching "itch." "When I was making my decision whether or not to play collegiate basketball, it was then I was asked by Trempealeau's Rick Thiesse, to assist him and Galesville native, Luke Neitzel, in coaching a seventh grade boys basketball team," Mitchell said. "That year we won the state tournament. I have loved coaching ever since."

For Madison, a love of basketball only grew during her years being coached by Rick Schmidt at G-E-T.

"My senior year (2015-16) was especially memorable when we made it all the way to the sectional final. It was a great way to end the high school career," Madison said. "The program's growth over my years was really what propelled me to continue my collegiate basketball career."

Both Doerr's have excelled off the court as well, as Mitchell has attained a Bachelor's Degree in exercise sport science - coaching competitive athletics in addition to his Master's Degree from WSU. Madison

recently received her Bachelor's in nursing while also being recognized throughout her four years for academic achievement, culminating in a Senior Scholar Athlete Distinction from Viterbo. The award goes to the senior with the highest GPA that must stay above a 3.5 on a 4.0 scale. Madison said the two have remained close, serving as each other's greatest supporters in their pursuits both athletically and academically.

"Our close relationship remained evident both on and off the court - supporting each other to do our best and stay focused in our academic pursuits and during training season," Madison said. "I appreciate the unconditional commitment he gives to make his players better."

Mitchell added that he is grateful to coach athletes like Madison while pursuing his goal of one day returning to the NBA coaching ranks.

"I am so incredibly proud of how diligent and determined my younger sister, Madison, has turned out to be and I cannot wait to hear of all the incredible things she is going to do in the field of nursing," Mitchell said. "In a much larger picture, I've been given the opportunity to impact lives, but she has been given the opportunity to save them."

## WIAA: No decision on fall sports season yet

While a report by a radio station out of Green Bay may have created some excitement, an official from the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association said the group's board of directors has not yet made a decision on if the fall sports season will be conducted.

WNFL out of Green Bay posted a story on its website with the headline reading "WIAA gives okay to restart sports." That "okay" was never given according to WIAA Communications Director Todd Clark, who said that the casual reader could

find the story misleading. "We are optimistic and hopeful that our schools will be able to provide fall sports," Clark said. "However, it will ultimately come down to local and state health leaders, who are the experts determining if our schools can provide sport opportunities for their student-athletes."

The story on WNFL was, apparently, referring to an interview given to NBC26 out of Green Bay by Wade Labecki, the WIAA's deputy director.

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## County health department offers guidance for sports participation

The Trempealeau County Health Department released guidelines for sports participation, which decrease the chances of area baseball or softball leagues competing this summer due to the risk of COVID-19 spread and transmission.

The health department officially recommended that adult and youth team-contact sports be suspended at this time, noting that sports are considered a public gathering, which should be limited to 10 people or fewer.

"The risk of spreading COVID-19 increases when more players or coaches interact, close physical contact occurs and equipment is shared by multiple players," a release sent by the health department said.

While nearly all youth sporting leagues have already been cancelled for the summer, the adult Chippewa River Baseball League has only suspended play for the time being with the possibility of competing later this summer.

Should games be played, the release sent by the health department said physical distancing of six feet between individuals needs to be maintained at all times. Such distancing would limit contact for baseball players in dugouts and on-field meetings between players or coaches.

"We're planning on football on Aug. 4, issuing equipment and practice on Aug. 5," Labecki said. "Now the experts in the medical area may change our options. They're the experts on that, we're getting ready to be ready for that. Getting ready to assist our schools."

Clark said the WIAA's position is that safety and health are the biggest concerns.

WIAA officials have previously said that sports would not continue without school being in session. An executive order by Governor Tony Evers closed schools indefinitely last April, the overturning of Evers' Safer at Home order did not impact that ruling. At this point, no announcement has been made about the return of school.

If players can maintain physical distancing, the health department offered the following guidelines to help minimize the spread of COVID-19:

- Do not share any gear (balls, bats, mats, rackets, etc.) as much as possible, and clean shared gear between users
- Do not share water bottles, coolers, or food items
- Stay home when sick with any symptoms of COVID-19 (Current list of symptoms <https://www.dhs.wisconsin.gov/covid-19/symptoms.htm>)
- Provide spaces for hand washing or supply hand sanitizer
- Cover coughs or sneezes

(into the sleeve or elbow, not hands)

- Clean high-touch surfaces often (railings, doors, etc.)
- Do not allow handshakes or high-fives
- Consider only holding activities for older youth or adults who can follow physical distancing requirements
- Review WEDC Reopen Guidelines: <https://wedc.org/reopen-guidelines/>

The CRBL had planned on beginning play on Sunday of this week, but decided instead to suspend the beginning of the season indefinitely. In the release announcing the suspension of the season, league officials cited the uncertainty of social guidelines, restric-

tions of field availability and concern over public safety.

The Wisconsin Baseball Association announced its intentions to hold its annual state tournament last week. The tournament is scheduled for Aug. 14-16 with 12 teams - two from each league - playing. The teams competing in the single-elimination tournament will be determined by the leagues themselves.

The hope, according to WBA secretary Chris LaBreche, is to hold the tournament in Spooner with a secondary site to be determined. LaBreche said that the plan was dependent on clearance from local municipalities and public health officials.

## We Don't Need Sports' Distraction Right Now

Although many would love to change the conversation right now to how close sports are to returning, it is past time to address what they have distracted us from.

For far too long, white Americans such as myself have viewed the rectification of racial injustices in our country as "not our fight." Although I have used this column space to support Colin Kaepernick and the conversation around systemic racial injustices he was trying to start over the past couple years, I now realize I have barely tread past the point of entertaining viewpoints other than my own.

Perhaps for me personally it is my perception of journalistic ethics that led to not wanting to get involved politically, but I was fooling myself to ever think racial equality was a political issue. It has been often co-opted as a political issue, but the inherent truth that the experiences of white and black people in our country are not equal is not up for debate.

The trend that is becoming increasingly clear however is that incidents like George Floyd being held to the ground by Minneapolis Police Officer David Chauvin's knee as Floyd pleaded "I can't breathe," are viewed as isolated occurrences. How many times over the past decade or more have we heard the phrase: "It's just a few bad apples..."

I find it ironic that the same logic is often not applied to those who have peacefully protested, whose message is drowned out by looted businesses thanks to "a few bad apples." There are many right now making the case that a few police officers employing brutal use of force does not represent the whole, but not extending the same courtesy to protesters undermined by looters. That bias right there is not nothing.

George Floyd, Breonna Taylor and a laundry list of others are not isolated incidents, they are canaries in the coal mine for systemic issues in our country. Those issues transcend beyond police interactions to nearly every aspect of American life.

Americans need to stop wrapping their ignorance to racial disparities in red white and blue support for the troops and police and calling it "patriotism." This is our fight regardless of race, and it will not end until we engage in the uncomfortable conversations we would rather not have, speak up when others espouse racist views and amplify the voices of the oppressed.

America doesn't need a distraction right now, we have work to do.

Persons violating Sections 44.01, 44.015, 44.02, 44.025 and 44.03 shall be fined as follows:

(1.) First offense, a municipal fine of fifty dollars (\$50.00).

(2.) Second offense, a civil forfeiture of fifty dollars (\$50.00) plus costs.

(3.) Third or subsequent offence a civil forfeiture of seventy-five dollars (\$75.00) plus costs.
