Cities close meetings on sewer plant smell

While the public gets a periodic dose of smell from Whitehall's struggling wastewater plant, the two cities and the company involved have closed their meetings on how they may be trying to resolve the problem.

The cities of Whitehall and Blair both met in executive session last week to discuss next steps regarding a \$208,870 surcharge Whitehall has levied against Blair for overages from Associated Milk Producers Inc. (AMPI). The *Times* has requested Trempealeau County District Attorney John Sacia investigate whether the Whitehall meeting should have been open to the public.

In addition to the smell, the overloaded plant has discharged into the Trempealeau River over the past several months biological material, copper, phosphorus and "suspended solids" that in some instances were three times the allowable limit, according to a May 13 notice from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. In some instances, the excesses have lessened since their peaks in December and January, according to the DNR documents. The "suspended solids," however, rose in March compared to January.

Were Whitehall not to respond to the excesses, it could face a \$10,000 per day fine.

Mark Johnson, Whitehall's director of public works, said the plant is still suffering the effects of the AMPI overload during the winter, though "it's better than it was a month ago." Last winter's excessive discharges from AMPI are the second in three years. In both cases, the overloaded plant sent odor across the city.

Whitehall Mayor Jeff Hauser said the odor is not "all day every day, though I don't want to minimize it either."

Hauser said he always wants to err on the "side of safety" when the city's legal advisors recommend a closed meeting. The city's attorney Christopher Gierhart said the closed Whitehall meeting last Tuesday was justified

because it involved "discussing penalties which may be imposed or other action it may take against Blair pursuant to the agreement in order to achieve compliance" with the DNR permit.

"Clearly, the exception is appropriate as the city cannot have its negotiation strategy made public as it would jeopardize the bargaining position," Gierhart said in an email exchange with the *Times*.

The state attorney general, however, has said in a 2019 opinion that public bodies are obliged to tell how an open meeting would jeopardize a strategy. That was not done in the Whitehall case and is one element of the opinion about the closed meeting the *Times* is seeking from Sacia.


In an email to AMPI's attorney, Gierhart said "Whitehall anticipates having a response to Blair and AMPI regarding the penalties and next steps next week after the city's common council meeting on Tuesday." No action taken by the council was made public.

The closed Blair meeting last Monday may have been more justified since that city was to discuss legal strategy regarding "litigation in which it is or is likely to become involved regarding AMPI and excessive BOD loading." According to the email exchange between Gierhart and AMPI attorney Eric Callisto, Blair attorney Mark Radcliffe requested a letter to the city of Blair that describes steps AMPI has taken to help prevent exceedances going forward.

Callisto said AMPI intended to provide that letter and that it "will also emphasize that AMPI does not intend through its actions to jeopardize City of Whitehall wastewater services to the City of Blair, and looks to resolve the surcharge amount as soon as possible."

Whitehall and Blair agreed in 1983 to allow Blair to deliver wastewater to Whitehall. That agreement requires Blair to monitor discharges into the Whitehall system and delineates penalties for overages.

Times seeks county records

Through an attorney and the Wisconsin Newspaper Association (WNA), the *Times* is attempting to gain access to records related to the departure of Trempealeau County Director of Land Management Kevin Lien.

Though county corporation counsel Rick Niemeier has refused previous requests for those records, County Board Chair John Aasen Monday said Lien signed a letter of "involuntary resignation."

After hearing the *Times* was working with the WNA, Aasen said the former department director upon his departure received only accrued paid time off and the ability to keep health insurance through the federal COBRA program.

Niemeier Tuesday said he was looking forward to receiving the WNA letter and would respond to it.

Lien had been on paid leave from January until late-May when the county announced he was no longer its employee. He had been the subject of staff complaints which were investigated by the county's insurance carrier.

On June 7, the *Times* submitted a Freedom of Information Act request for the investigation report, a copy of the resignation/dismissal and any severance package for Lien.

Niemeier responded with a document that explained that Lien was no longer a county employee, however it redacted information about how his separation from the county came to be.

Galesville Founders Day Celebration is Saturday

The day that recognizes and celebrates Galesville's proud history is this Saturday.

A few of those who will be honored at Galesville Founders Day include George Gale (1816-1868, pioneer, judge, legislator, founder of Gale College and the city of Galesville) Captain Alexander A. Arnold (1833-1915, lawyer, politician, innovative farmer) and Rev. D.O. Van Slyke (1818-1890, circuit rider). This event is held annually on the third Saturday in June and is sponsored by the Galesville Area Chamber of Commerce.

The 1st Brigade Band of Watertown will punctuate the celebration with half hour concerts at the Arnold House at 11 a.m. and Old Main at 3:30 p.m. The group replicates Wisconsin's own band of the 1st Brigade, 3rd Division, 15th Army Corps formed in 1864 who participated, under the command of Gen. Dave Kiral will play music at the bandstand from 9:15 to 10:15 a.m. and you may hear the Gate City Band from Winona between 10:30 and 12:30 a.m.

Blair council pauses on street project action

If the city of Blair receives a grant to help pay for the reconstruction of Broadway St., they may look for another path through town. Until then, however, the city council agreed not to commit funding to the project that might not happen in the near future.

The city has applied for a Community Block Development Grant to help fund the reconstruction of Broadway St. Should that grant be approved, the project would be done in 2022, until then, however, the council declined to commit funding to solve a traffic flow problem while the work is underway. The city isn't expected to hear if the grant is approved until August.

The council did not act on a recommendation to pay \$32,000 to begin the process to plat property and \$34,000 to pay for the repaving of a parking lot owned by Simmons Construction. Both would've been part of a plan to direct traffic from one side of the city to the other, but council members wanted to wait until they know if the project will be done.

The idea to plat property — which was formally Taylor St., but had been vacated by the city sometime between 1873 and 1902 — came from city engineer Short Elliott Hendrickson. That portion, apparently, has what was referred to as a large water main under the road, which the city would like access to and could be made into a permanent road.

City attorney Mark Radcliffe, however, suggested they don't need to a plat, saying the area can be dedicated by the property owners. Should the water main need repairs, the city could acquire an easement to do so.

"If you've made no decision on putting a street there, why do you want to spend \$32,000 on platting?" Radcliffe asked.

Even if the city would want to put a road there, Radcliffe said the city doesn't need an official plat. The conversation then moved to using the Simmons Construction parking lot as an alley through traffic during construction. While he said his recommendation wasn't for the city to repave the parking lot, David Schofield of SEH recommended the city reach an agreement with Simmons in which the

company allows temporary access through the parking lot during construction in return for a one-time lease payment of \$34,000 — the same amount estimated to repave the lot.

"We want to wait until we get the grant before we decide if we're going to redo somebody's parking lot," alderman Mike Lisowski said.

Alderman Dennis Stephenson questioned if the city should be spending the money at all.

"I can't see us paying for somebody's parking lot," Stephenson said. "If we have to go through the park, go through the park."

The alternative to the Taylor St. and Simmons parking lot plan would be directing traffic through Riverside Memorial Park, which members of the Blair-Preston Fire Department have said would cause a delay in their response time. Stephenson noted that he was once on the fire department and doesn't think the number of calls that

would be delayed warrant spending money to repave the parking lot.

Other council members questioned spending the money on a short-term solution, but the cost to create a permanent street through the city exceeded \$200,000.

"I just don't see a real easy short term solution," Stephenson said. "I think we're spinning our wheels."

The council also did not act on a bid for a geotechnical investigation to determine the quality of the soil and groundwater level below Broadway St. Schofield recommended having the investigation done because contractors would charge a higher rate without having that information ahead of time.

The council did not act on the \$4,450 bid from Professional Service Industries out of Chippewa Falls, however.

The council did approve a bid for \$27,450 to repave Riverside Memorial Park, adding a one-way loop with directional parking.

Sand mine mum on Arcadia request, gets payroll loan

A sand mine company that has not responded to the city of Arcadia's request for a new reclamation proposal received a federal payroll protection loan in 2020 though its operations likely ended in 2019 or earlier.

According to several federal loan tracking sites, CSI Sands Wisconsin, which operated a frack sand mine on Thompson Valley Road, received a \$356,035 loan May 29, 2020 to save 17 jobs at the site. The loans were part of a federal program to help businesses survive shut-downs during the pandemic.

While it was not possible to determine exactly when the mine stopped opera-

tions, it was likely in 2019 or earlier, several officials familiar with the mine said. The mine and equipment were put up for auction in September 2020, and some of the property was sold, according to the county's treasurer. Neither CSI Sands Wisconsin nor the auction company responded to requests for comment.

In addition to the loan, which data from the U.S. Office of Personnel Management indicates has not been repaid, CSI Sands Wisconsin owes Trempealeau County \$301,329 for two years of unpaid property taxes and the city of Arcadia \$46,530 for one year of personal property taxes.

County treasurer Laurie

Halama said notice was given to CSI Sands Wisconsin in September 2020 that it had two years to pay the back taxes or face foreclosure. She said a portion of the mine was sold in 2020, and some county taxes were paid from those proceeds.

Meanwhile the city of

Arcadia has not received a response from the company regarding the city's request it either increase the money set-aside for mine reclamation to \$2 million or create a new reclamation plan, according to city administrator Chad Hawkins.

The mine site, accord-


ing to city engineers, has 40-foot-tall cliffs that would preclude the residential development that was initially proposed for the reclaimed mine property. CSI Sands has set aside \$722,000 for reclamation but earlier this year told the city the work could be done for \$250,000.

Niemeier also declined to include information of a severance package writing in a denial letter "the Trempealeau County Board of Supervisors asserts that [the severance package and investigation report] are privileged in their entirety under attorney-client and/or work product privileges." The Times submitted a second request asking Niemeier to reconsider, but did not receive a response. Working through the

WNA, attorney James Friedman of Godfrey & Kahn, S.C. wrote in a letter to Niemeier: "The attorney-client privilege and the work product doctrine do not protect documents that are shared with third parties. Hence, once the county provided any termination or severance-related documents to Mr. Lien, those documents lost any protection, and the privileges no longer applied." In the letter sent on Tuesday of this week, Friedman wrote that the termination and severance records "sim-

ply are not privileged, and the investigation report may or may not be." "In any event, your denial is contrary to Wisconsin law, either in whole or in part, and we ask that you reconsider your decision," Friedman wrote. The Times has maintained that the records regarding Lien's case should be public as taxpayer funds were used for the investigation, to pay Lien while he was on leave and on a severance package, if one exists. Furthermore, land management depart-

ment employees have said reports of abuse previously went ignored by county board supervisors. The investigation report could confirm or refute those allegations. "Ultimately, the public is entitled to records concerning the termination of employment of high-ranking government officials, like Mr. Lien," Friedman wrote. "Mr. Lien was the Trempealeau County Land Management Director for more than a decade. In that role, he oversaw county actions related to land conservation, planning,

surveying, and zoning. His department also engaged in building inspections. In other words, his work impacted virtually every citizen of Trempealeau County. The public is entitled to know whether Mr. Lien resigned or if he was fired. If he was fired, the public deserves to know why. Finally, the people of Trempealeau County are entitled to know the terms of Mr. Lien's departure, including if those terms included spending public funds." Friedman continued noting "Wisconsin courts con-

Council agrees to extend Blair swimming lessons

After some debate the Blair city council agreed last week Monday to add another session of swimming lessons.
The council heard from pool director Gwen Kidd who said they have had an unprecedented number of kids sign up for swimming lessons, leading to some scheduling issues. She said there is a high demand for people wanting swimming lessons in the evening hours because parents are unable to transport their children during the day.
Kidd proposed closing the pool during the evening open swimming season — 6 to 7:45 p.m. — to allow swimming lessons from July 19 to July 30. The plans would be contingent on getting enough children interested in swimming lessons. She said it is a plan other area pools have implemented in order to fill the need, adding that she has heard of some families who are planning on taking their children to other area pools for lessons.
Council member Jill Anderson resisted the change. "We have advertised open swimming at that time," she said.
Kidd said the hours the pool is open have been the same for 40 years, whereas other pools have adjusted their hours.
"This day in age, we have to be flexible and families have to be flexible and understanding," Kidd said.
Kidd said that she would have at least 15 students in the evening swimming lesson session, but guessed there would many more should they offer the option. She also noted that they had 53 swimmers at the pool at the time of the meeting.
"My concern is that you close it for 15 when we have 53 right there," council member Paul Syverson said.
Anderson added that the 53 are "paying customers."
"Is it more important to accommodate 20 families — and that might be a stretch — who might be upset or is it more important to teach our children

25 YEARS AGO June 20, 1996

The Independence School District will get a new pre-school through high school building, if the school board and district voters accept the recommendation of a special committee. The long-range facilities planning committee met last week Monday and voted unanimously to recommend construction of a new school on a 40-acre site. The board and district administration are making preparations to hold a referendum on financing the project sometime this fall.

Trempealeau County needs to be prepared for the possibility that a mining company could want to dig for precious metals in the county. That was the warning given to the county board of supervisors by one of its members Monday night. Supervisor Dave Anderson of Whitehall said that the board's zoning committee had been looking into reports that the company was buying mining leases from property owners in the town of Hale.

Hoping to boost participation in stream bank improvement projects, Trempealeau County will pick up part of the cost of the conservation work. The county board of supervisors approved paying 10 percent of the costs of some stream bank improvements done as part of the Upper and Middle Trempealeau River Priority Watershed Projects.

New City Antiques and Refinishings opened May 17 on Main St. in Independence. The store is owned by Arcadia native Terrence Sobotta and managed by Geraldine Wronske.

The Arcadia city council passed a motion to purchase a new street sweeper for the city. The council approved a bid of \$74,800 from Polk and Diesel out of Madison over a \$71,200 bid from Bruce Municipal Equipment, Inc., out of Menominee Falls. The higher bid was accepted because members of the city street department thought the maintenance on the sweeper would be much easier.

The Galesville Area Chamber of Commerce has pledged to raise half the projected \$391,000 cost of improving and upgrading Main Street, the Square and some adjoining streets. It turns, it wants the city to pick up the balance, starting with \$43,100 next year. That's half the estimated cost of adding graded trees, decorative brick sidewalk borders and decorative lighting.

If it takes a village to raise a child, it takes two villages, plus a city and lots of folks in between to raise, or at least revise, the planned Gale-Etrick-Trempealeau Kindermook Center. That's why a citizen's task force helping turn St. Mary's Hall into Kindermook is also

turning the conversion into a community project. It's "Hands Helping Hands — for people of all ages and communities," said Scott Strommen, a member of the task force. The group hopes to harness "volunteer power" of folks throughout the school district.

Eighty-three residents were evacuated from Grand View Care Center last Friday afternoon following a bomb threat. No one was injured as everyone was transferred from the home to the school and back again, safely. The threat turned out to be a prank.

Camping enthusiasts may have a new place to go in Trempealeau County. Development of a campground area at Pietrek Park in rural Arcadia was proposed to the Trempealeau County Parks Committee. Park planners got permission from the county board to do a feasibility and cost study of having campsites opened at the park. Grants may be available to help pay for camping and recreational improvements at the park, supporters said.

50 YEARS AGO June 24, 1971

A storm of tornadic proportions lashed the immediate Whitehall area for about a half hour last week Wednesday. Strong winds were accompanied by golf ball-sized hail in some places, and a downpour that stopped traffic at times.

An open house and retirement party will be held this Saturday for Alfred Gunderson, who established the Gunderson Chevrolet dealership in Pleasantville 48 years ago. The business was incorporated earlier this year under the ownership of his son, Arthur, and Ralph Rasmuson of Whitehall.

Bill and John Giebel of Tremplo Cablevision are currently installing a system that will make cable television available to Whitehall residents.

Larry Sonsalla, son of Mr. and Mrs. LaVern Sonsalla, rural Arcadia, was elected a state officer and Jerome Waldera, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Waldera, also of rural Arcadia, was honored with the Wisconsin Farmer Degree at the state FFA convention held in Green Lake June 14 to 16. Thomas Tisthammer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Merton Tisthammer, Galesville, was also awarded the Wisconsin Farmer Degree.

The old River Street bridge crossing the Trempealeau River went down with a crash shortly after 2 a.m. Sunday. It had been closed to traffic for the past two weeks because of structural damage and tornado-like winds during a severe storm about 6 p.m. Saturday are believed to have weakened the structure further and caused its collapse.

During the electrical storm Monday morning, lightning struck on the Peter Simenson farm east of town and killed three milk cows and a bull.

Memorial services will be held at Our Lady of Perpetual Help church Monday for Sgt. Milton Haines, son of

Mr. and Mrs. Leo Haines of Arcadia. Sgt. Haines, a gunner on a B-29 Superfortress, has been missing since May 24, 1945 when he went on a mission over Tokyo and it is presumed that he was killed in action at that time.

A city of Arcadia ordinance expressly forbids shooting of firearms within the city limits. It has been called to my attention that there has been some violation of this ruling recently. Citizens are hereby warned that such violations will not be tolerated and violators will be prosecuted. — Albert Rohn, night marshal.

Blair experienced a small building boom: Four new homes, a pasteurizing plant, a dental office and two apartments.

100 YEARS AGO June 23, 1921

 In a series of emails sent to the Times as part of the Blair meeting packet, AM-PI's attorney acknowledges that the company is likely responsible for problems at the Whitehall plant.
 "In short summary," Callisto said in an email to Gierhardt, "AMPI is reviewing the analysis, but is likely not in a position to contest the (excess biological material discharges) figures. AMPI is seeking additional time to pay its bill to Blair in order to do any necessary evaluation, and has questioned the calculation of the penalty figure. It also is seeking information on how the surcharge will be used."
 "My client is quite anxious to start a dialogue," Callisto writes in another email to Gierhardt, "as the city of Blair is quite anxious about the outstanding bill from the City of Whitehall. Please let your client know that they should anticipate a call from AMPI. I am happy to take a call with you on this when you are able. I still assume that the city of Whitehall is not inclined to cutoff service to the City of Blair over this."

However the most meaningful event to me was the opportunity at the funeral home to share an excerpt of an award acceptance speech from the late ESPN commentator Stuart Scott, who also passed of cancer in 2015. In the last year of his life while receiving the Jimmy V Award for Perseverance for his public ongoing battle with cancer at the time, Scott said:

"When you die, that does not mean that you lose to cancer. You beat cancer by how you live, why you live and in the manner in which you live."

To me this quote perfectly encapsulated my Aunt Kathie's fight. Not a battle lost, but a lifetime of victories that came in many forms. Each moment with her grandchildren, each time she greeted a visitor with a warm smile and made them feel like the most important person in the room and experiences like going to Potawatomi Casino fresh off a treatment were just a few of the examples of how she beat the hell out of cancer.

Her illustration of a faith-based life continues to inspire me as I begin to hit "resume" on everything from in-person meeting coverage to family gatherings to Brewers games. All who loved her carry on with how we live, why we live and the manner in which we live.

Waiting On Rodgers Could Cost Packers Big

The game of chicken the Green Bay Packers are playing with quarterback Aaron Rodgers might already have been more costly than it's worth.

While Rodgers hasn't said much publicly, there have been numerous reports that he isn't happy and that he isn't going to play for the Packers. To which the Packers have simply said, "we're not trading him."

Many who know Rodgers or at least have an idea of how he operates have said they think he's stubborn enough to hold out and never play for the organization again.
