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Few area changes after spring election

The incumbents mostly emerged victorious as there were very few changes following a controversial spring election.

The election was briefly postponed after Gov. Tony Evers issued an executive order, but that order was fought by the Legislature and the Wisconsin Supreme Court overruled Evers (see more elsewhere in this week's Times). Still, in order to allow more time for absentee ballots, the results were held until Monday of this week.

Incumbent Beth Killian was the winner of the only contested race for the Trempealeau County Board of Supervisors, finishing with 185 votes to John Krett's 110 in District Seven, representing the town of Arcadia.

Nobody registered to run for the seat in District Five, however incumbent Jon Schultz received the most

write-in votes with 17. Because Schultz did not file for reelection, county clerk Paul Syverson said he was going to check with state officials to see if Schultz was eligible for the position. If he is, he would have to register to accept the spot on the board. If not, the second-most votes were received by another former board member, Tom Bice.

There will be at least two new board members.

In District One Richard Frey chose not to seek reelection and Rick Nemitz ran unopposed for his spot. Dan Schreiner won the District 13 seat, previously held by the retiring Olin Fimreite, with 28 votes as a registered write-in.

The city of Blair ended up having three contested races for the council with two registered write-ins, but the incumbents emerged victorious.

In Ward One, Wanda Carrette finished with 42 votes to Nathan Dahl's 34. Jill Anderson won Ward Two with 40 votes, while John Rawson had 26 and registered write-in Kirby Brekke had three. Mike Lisowski had 74 votes in Ward Three against registered write-in Shannon Moats, who finished with eight.

The village of Trempealeau will have one newcomer and he actually received the most votes as Don Hellrung — who previously served on the board in the 1990s — received 290 votes. Incumbents Kit Locke (266) and Bridgette Turner (191) were re-elected to the board, beating out Chad Narva (149). Lois Taylor also appeared on the ballot and received 135 votes, but she announced she would not seek reelection weeks before the election.

Final results for the only contested school board race were not in as of press time on Tuesday. In Trempealeau County, incumbents Dana Conrad and Brian Steinlicht had the most votes for the Arcadia school board. Conrad tallied 556 votes while Steinlicht totaled 451 and challenger Julie Hurlburt

County road work begins

While much of the county is shut down, work on repairing roads and bridges has begun.

The Trempealeau County Highway Department published a map on social media that included 13 stretches of county highways that are scheduled to be repaired during the summer of 2020. Among those projects is the reconstruction of 1.5 miles of County Highway H between Highway 93 and Quarry Rd. Other reconstruction projects include stretches of County J near Dodge and County G near Pine Creek and County AA near the southern border of the county.

Three bridges will also be replaced in the county this summer, including the bridge along Dopp Road in Ettrick, which began last week. The County D bridge on Main St. in the village of Ettrick will also be replaced. The Dopp Road project is scheduled to last about two months before the County D bridge project begins and is slated to last another two months. The combined cost for the projects is \$955,421.

A bridge on Creek Road just south of Independence will also be replaced at a cost

of \$284,447.

According to the highway department's Facebook page, there are plans to replace nine other bridges within the next three years.

State highway project plans for this summer include the resurfacing of Highway 93/121 from just north of Independence to the northern and western borders of the county in Albion and Chimney Rock. Another stretch of Highway 93, between Arcadia and Tamarack will be resurfaced this summer.

Seal-coating will be done along U.S. Highway 53 between Pigeon Falls and Osseo and pavement will be repaired on 53 between the Highway 95 intersection and the Whitehall city limits.

Culvert installation will begin this coming Monday south of Strum on Highway D between H and OO before the crew moves north of Whitehall on County D between Highway 53 and County E. Both projects will have temporary closures during the day with the first projected to last a week and the second for two weeks.



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Local officials respond to election controversy

Two local elected officials responded to the controversial April 7 election which had been postponed by the governor's order before that decision was overruled by the Wisconsin Supreme Court, meaning the election was held as planned.

In a column sent on Monday of this week, 31st District State Senator Jeff Smith, a Democrat, went through a timeline, beginning March 12 when Gov. Tony Evers declared a public health emergency in Wisconsin and ending April 6 when Evers ordered that the election be postponed.

"(Evers) called on Legislature to meet in special session to address the election date; however, Republican leaders chose not to meet," Smith

wrote. "Later that day, the Wisconsin Supreme Court ruled the April 7 election to go on, as planned, against the guidance of health experts."

Smith also detailed another executive order signed by Evers on April 3, in which he called for a special session on April 4. "Republican leaders gavelled in and out within minutes, rejecting changes he made to protect voters and election workers," Smith said.

State Representative Treig Pronschinske, a Republican representing the 92nd Assembly District, said postponing the election would've caused other problems.

"If the election was postponed to a later date, there would have been vacancies at the local level for months or unfair extended terms for some," Pronschinske wrote in an official statement released

Monday. "During such an unprecedented time locally, nationally, and worldwide, elected officials are critical to guiding the public through this pandemic."

Pronschinske said that Evers had not had a "firm stance" on the election saying he "has been playing games at the expense of Wisconsinites across our state." Pronschinske said Evers had originally "strongly supported" keeping the April 7 date.

"My colleagues and I encouraged our constituents to vote absentee, and this election had one of the largest number of absentee ballots ever casted," Pronschinske said.

Smith noted what he said was a lack of action from the Republican-led Legislature.

"Republicans still haven't taken action on Governor Evers' COVID-19 relief proposals, introduced more than three weeks ago," Smith said. "While Republican leaders have marked Governor Evers as the 'bad cop' they've sat on their hands throughout the first month, doing nothing to help Wisconsin during this crisis. Ironic, since they went to so much trouble to take power out of the Governor's hands during the 2018 Lame Duck Session so they could be the decision makers."

So far the Republican leaders only know how to stand in the way and criticize Governor Evers' swift response. That is not leadership. I hope by the time you read this, Republicans will have finally joined Governor Evers in making Wisconsin safer."

challenger Julie Hurlburt managed 366. The votes from Buffalo County were not yet available as of press time.

County voters chose Joe Biden as the democratic candidate with 2,583 votes to the 941 for Bernie Sanders. Sanders dropped out of the race on the day of the election.

County voters also supported winner Jill Karofsky over incumbent Daniel Kelly for the Wisconsin Supreme Court with 3,540 votes to

2,980. The race was officially nonpartisan but Democrats backed Karofsky and Republicans supported Kelly.

Voters in Trempealeau County also supported Marsy's Law to give addition rights to crime victims with 4,684 votes to 1,560. The majority also voted in favor of having legislature create a nonpartisan procedure for the preparation of legislative and congressional district plans and maps with 4,716 votes to 1,440.

25 YEARS AGO April 20, 1995

The city of Whitehall could issue an order within days that would force the owner of the former Walgreen Hotel to demolish the building. The city's legal firm, Koslo and Kostner of Arcadia, this week issued documents initiating action against Corazon Petersen of Blair under the city's dilapidated buildings ordinance.

Design work on a proposed courthouse improvement project got a go-ahead of sorts from the Trempealeau County Board of Supervisors Monday night. A "straw vote" by the board directed the Eau Claire architectural firm of Seymour Davis and Seymour to proceed with plans for the project, which would rearrange offices and update electrical, heating and ventilation services.

Perhaps, like the train in the children's story, they should call Pigeon Falls "The Little Village That Could." The small town "where everyone is important," as the signs proclaim, is getting bigger in terms of economic development and its annual business-promotion event is growing too. Merchants from the village and the surrounding area will host their annual Pigeon Falls Day this Saturday in the village's downtown area. The sixth-annual event will involve more businesses and offer more entertainment, promotions, events and "freebies."

The body of 83-year-old Albert Misch was found in a town of Preston field Sunday afternoon. Misch, who lived alone in an apartment in Whitehall, had disappeared in early November. He was found about five miles south of Whitehall. County authorities do not believe foul play was involved, although Misch's death is still under investigation.

The Arcadia Lioness Club was presented with an award by the regional governor of the organization for being one of the first 30 Lioness Clubs in the world. The organization was chartered on Jan. 16, 1976 with members Patricia Brovold, Pauline George, MaryLou Halvorsen, Mary Nelson, Nita Vogel and Joyce Wanek. The club currently has about 50 members.

The Arcadia city council passed a motion which allowed a group of citizens to pursue the idea of building a playground at Memorial Park for the children. The group, headed by LeAnne Boebel, had to seek permission from the council before they tried to get the plans set into motion.

Creation of a hiking trail around one portion of Lake Marinuka has been proposed as a possible community project by the Galesville Lions Club. Lion Kaye Henderson, representing the club, told the Galesville city council that the organization is willing to plan and finance the project, possibly with grants — if the city is interested.

What direction will middle school athletics take in the Gale-Etrick-Trempealeau School District? A school board committee studying the issue listened to parents and educators for two-and-a-half hours without reaching a decision. The policy committee is to meet again in May, hoping, in the meantime, some new element or solution will pop up to simplify the decision making. Many of those at last week's meeting argued for an intramural program.

Tri-State Ambulance, newly purchased by Lutheran Hospital-La Crosse, has asked Galesville and Trempealeau to sign exclusive contracts with the firm. Under the contractors, all emergency calls handled by a 911 dispatcher would be routed to Tri-State.

50 YEARS AGO April 23, 1970

Demolition of the old Tri-County Memorial Nursing Home — the former Community Hospital building — began this week Monday. In its place, a parking area for doctors and emergency entrance for the new hospital and nursing home will be built.

Dr. Celondonio Barrameda and his wife arrived in Whitehall Friday, and the new local physician is now practicing in the Whitehall Medical Clinic building on Dewey St.

Whitehall's newly-remodeled and enlarged city restaurant, now known as the Norse Inn, will open for business this Saturday.

For the first time in its history, Western Wisconsin Technical Institute will field a baseball team. The head coach will be Whitehall native Larry Sosalla.

Arcadia Mayor Orvin Angst ended 28 years of service to the city. Angst spent 20 years as an alderman in the city and an additional eight years as the mayor.

Dairyland Laboratory has now started to conduct a soil testing program at their offices in Arcadia. The facility is now said to be one of the most complete laboratories in the state of Wisconsin.

Minard Stenberg, Etrick, left for Rochester, Minn., where he is being sent by the Etrick Lions Club to enter a leader dog school for the blind. He was accompanied by Mrs. Stenberg, who was

permitted to remain with her husband for a few days. Stenberg will have a four-week course of instruction with a leader dog at the school. Stenberg has been losing his vision for the past several years. He was formerly engaged in carpenter work.

Trempealeau High School's Junior-Senior Prom court members were Norma Woestman, Susan Wojciechowski, Kathy Klein, Bev McDonah, Kim Freeman (queen), Randy Lakey, Dan Thill, Bill Herman, Larry Frommelt (king) and Dave Gillies.

The Gale-Etrick schools are again offering a course in "Human Growth and Reproduction." Open to all sixth graders, the course will begin April 25. The course, which is not compulsory, will offer films and textbooks related to the "details of sex, related to reproduction and to the child's sex identity."

75 YEARS AGO April 19, 1945

Briggs Transfer Co. has announced that, effective April 30, its general office will move from Whitehall to Eau Claire. The company's headquarters has been located here since it was organized 10 years ago.

Harold Lindstrom of El Paso, Texas, has bought the business block on Main St. known as the Schaefer building from E.A. Sletteland of Pigeon Falls. The building is at present occupied by Lester Hanson's restaurant and H.M. De Bow's barbershop. Mr. Lindstrom, son-in-law of W.A. Lieberg of this city, plans to move his wife and infant daughter to Whitehall in the near future.

R.G. Amundson of Ridgeland, this state, has been engaged as buttermaker for the Pigeon Falls Cooperative Creamery. Mr. Amundson, who has had charge of the creamery at Ridgeland for eight years, succeeds Melford Monson, an employee of the creamery for 32 years.

Green Bay and Western Railroad crews have extended three new sidetracks across West St., where only the main track crossed heretofore.

Peter Engen has bought a lot in east Whitehall directly north of the Sever Moen residence, and will move onto it the former Ingrid Olson house on Abrams St., which he purchased from the city last month.

The fellows at Whitehall High School are engaged in some form of sport at all times. At present, they are beginning a program of spring sports which includes track and spring basketball. Four track meets have been scheduled, include the conference and regional meets in Eau Claire and the state meet in Madison. Boys out for track are Bob Bensch,

Absence Makes The Heart Grow Tentative

Few people miss the sport of baseball more than myself as I found out this week. I had Fox Sports Wisconsin's Milwaukee Brewers commentator Brian Anderson on my "Small Town BS" podcast this past week, and hearing him wax poetic about the Brewers over our phone interview was the auditory equivalent of a "sight for sore eyes."

Even so, when reports surfaced last week that we may see the Major League Baseball season start in May, my reaction did not even rise to the level of cautious optimism. Board to discuss fate of spring season April 21

The Blair-Taylor softball team likely won't be returning to Madison for the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association state tournament for a fourth straight year, but whether or not they'll play at all could be decided this coming Tuesday.

The University of Wisconsin-Madison decided

last week to extend the cancellation of campus events through June 30, which eliminated the possibility of conducting WIAA state tournaments at campus venues this spring, according to a release sent by the WIAA. The decision to extend the closure addresses the ongoing concern and efforts to prevent and control the spread of the infectious disease COVID-19.

At its special meeting on March 19, the WIAA Board of Control resolved to postpone any decision to cancel the spring sports seasons and the spring state tournament series to a later date or until new developments arise and new information becomes available.

The board will conduct its scheduled meeting on April 21 via video conferencing and will discuss options for the remainder of the spring sports seasons and summer-time contact.

The release sent by the

WIAA said the organization will continue to be in alliance with the directives issued by Gov. Tony Evers in relation to the closure or reopening of schools. Interscholastic activities are extensions of the classroom and serve as a partner in the total education process. They do not operate independently from the school.

For Blair-Taylor softball coach Greg Bratina, it could mean missing out on a run at a WIAA state title.

The Wildcats have advanced to the state tournament three straight years with two second-place finishes. They returned much of the roster, including senior pitcher Lauren Steien.

"My senior girls were so ready for this season as they were hoping to finish what they started four years ago," Bratina said. "They put in a lot of off-season work and with the weather looking like it was going to cooperate — unlike the last couple of springs with all the snow. They were very excited to play."

Not having a season could

have a lasting impact too, Bratina said.

"These senior girls are and were going to be for the underclassmen, especially the freshman who could follow their example of how we practice and prepare for a game," Bratina said.

The B-T coach said he told his girls to do any drills they could, play catch and watch videos to help stay ready so they can hit the ground running if and when the season does begin.

"I try to stay in contact with the girls through e-mail with any news I hear to keep their hopes up," Bratina said.

He also said he encourages his players to follow the governor's orders and encourage their friends and families to do so as well.

"Maybe we can end this sooner and get back on the field and in the classroom," Bratina said.

County golf courses opened, closed last Friday

County golf courses were briefly given the go-ahead to open last Friday, before a sudden reverse course by the end of the business day.

In a letter to county golf course operators dated Thursday, April 9, that was shared with the Times, Trempealeau County Health Officer Barb Barczak and sheriff Brett Semingson informed operators that they could send patrons out on tee times with several specific precautions in place. By the end of the business day on Friday however, Barczak had ordered all county golf courses closed once again, in accordance with Gov. Tony Evers Safer at Home order.

At least two area golf courses were open in some capacity Friday under the initial advisement of Thurs-

day's letter, including Trempealeau Mountain Golf Club and Ettrick Golf Club. Precautions including spacing out tee-times, removing holes in favor of practice hole markers and removing pins, tee boxes, ball cleaners and other equipment were being taken.

The original letter from Thursday acknowledged, despite the preceding list of precautions, that to open golf courses for play in any capacity was a loose interpretation of the order.

"We are trying very hard to operate under the 'color' of the order vs. the 'letter' of the order," Barczak and Semingson wrote. "If we all work very hard at practicing social distancing in everything we do we will prevail when this perfect storm is over."

A "frequently asked questions" document about the Safer at Home order from Gov. Evers office dated March

24 does specifically address golf courses. In response to the question: "Will golf courses remain open?" The document reads "Golf courses are not considered essential businesses." It goes on to reinforce that staff can conduct "minimum basic operations as defined in the order."

Evers also acknowledged to 620 WTMJ in Milwaukee on Friday morning that golf courses had been a hot topic, but one at this point the state will not be budging.

"I'm not belittling the golf," Evers told WTMJ. "All things where people ask us to reconsider, we reconsider, but we're not at the point now to say we're going to open up golf courses."

As of Monday, the Safer at Home order was still slated to expire on April 24.

this life. The statement of Jesus to his disciples reveals the same principle in Matthew 7:6: “Do not give what is holy to dogs, and do not throw your pearls before swine or they will trample them under their feet, and turn and tear you to pieces.”

Jesus was instructing his disciples regarding the realities of doing Christian ministry. Dogs and swine were considered “unclean.” He is calling upon his servants to be mindful of who they are teaching and whether they are really open to the gospel. The gospel is a pearl of great price as is the coming Kingdom of God.
