


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New county building could get vote Sept. 28

The building oversight committee Monday approved the concept for a new county justice center that will be refined before going to the county board Sept. 28 for a vote.

The latest building design moves a jail drop-off port and delivery bays from Dewey Street to the ally connecting Dewey and Hobson streets. Committee members had previously recommended the change based on worries about Dewey Street traffic.

The Building Oversight Committee may meet perhaps twice more before a package of materials is prepared for an informational meeting for county supervisors Sept. 21. A formal communications package complete with an explanatory website would be launched after the Sept. 28 supervisors' vote.

County corporation counsel Rick Niemeier said there would be no point to launching a communication plan if supervisors voted down the building idea. Even on Sept. 28, Niemeier said it is possible the board would give a tentative nod to the plan and not yet launch the borrowing that will be required to complete the project.

The latest version of what is likely to be a \$38 million project maintains a 78-bed, pod-style jail, more sheriff's department space on the first floor and, on the second floor, courtrooms and offices for judges, clerks and the district attorney. Inmates would be transported via an elevator from the jail to the courtrooms, eliminating the current security risk of leading inmates down public corridors to court.

Details about which offices and departments go where are expected to be refined over the next few weeks.

Health department to release new 'compass'

Trempealeau County residents and businesses who have been missing the Coulee COVID-19 Compass can expect a replacement in the near future.

Trempealeau County Health Department Information Officer Kaila Baer said on Monday that the department hopes to release a metric that will help area residents determine the risk of the spread of COVID-19.

Trempealeau County had partnered with La Crosse County and other surrounding counties for the Coulee Compass, which issued risk levels ranging from low to severe. La Crosse County abruptly ended the compass in early August and has since released a new version called the Coulee COVID-19 Collaborative. The new CCC, however, is specific only to La Crosse County.

Baer said Trempealeau County plans to release its own version on Friday of this week.

"It will be similar to La Crosse County, but not identical," Baer said.

As of Monday of this week, the risk of spread seemed to be lowering. Last week marked the fewest new COVID-19 cases since the beginning of June.

The county health department

reported 21 new cases last week, the fewest since the week of June 1 to June 8. Those tested received positive results 9.6 percent of the time, also the lowest since the last week of June.

"It is reasonable to assume people are being smart about their actions in public," Baer said. "If we can keep this up as a community and model these smart behaviors to children, hopefully schools will continue to operate in person."

Baer said the mask mandate has likely contributed to the lower number of cases.

Also down is the number of tests issued. The 219 tests issued between Aug. 17 and Aug. 24, were the fewest since May and a significant drop off from the 290 tests per week the county has averaged over the past month.

One of the reasons, according to Baer, is because fewer people have reported symptoms of COVID-19.

"According to our healthcare partners, they are getting less calls for testing," Baer said. "This are likely multiple factors leading to this, including less people with symptoms and people not wanting a test for whatever reason. However, tests are available for those who need it."

The Arcadia area is still the most

impacted by COVID-19, but even there the number of new cases dropped. There were nine new cases in Arcadia over the past week, according to the Wisconsin Department of Health Services, about half the number of new cases the area has averaged weekly since the beginning of July. In all, the DHS has reported 184 cases in Arcadia, including 30 within the last two weeks.

The only other area that has had more than three new cases in each of the past two weeks is Independence, which saw an increase of seven for the second straight week. Whitehall had three new cases last week, Trempealeau had two, Blair/Etrick, Osseo and Eleva/Strum all had one new case.

As of Monday, Independence and Arcadia were the only municipalities with more than 10 active cases.

To date, there have been 398 cases of COVID-19 in Trempealeau County, including two deaths. As of Monday morning, there were 56 active cases, but nobody was hospitalized.

Nearly 60 percent of the people who tested positive for COVID-19 reported moderate symptoms, while roughly 30 percent were mild. Only 12 of the first 309 cases reported no symptoms and 24 had severe symptoms.



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Cross-country ride a lifelong dream for IHS graduate

The cross-country journey from Muklito, Wash. to Jamestown, R.I. is over 3,000 miles and nearly 50 hours by car, but for Russ Sobotta the ride took a bit longer.

Though he began his transcontinental bike ride on June 25, the dream of dipping a wheel of his bike off the edge of each coast has been in his mind since he was a senior at Independence High School in 1976.

"I remember sitting in the library and reading about an event called the 'Bikecentennial,' and this has been a dream of mine ever since," Sobotta said.

The new jail and sheriff's department might include room for a body scanner that would better identify contraband hidden anywhere on incoming inmates' bodies. was something he had never attempted. "I've averaged about 81 miles per day, and my highest so far is 128 in one day when I had the wind at my back in Montana," Sobotta said when he made his way through Trempealeau County last month. "I thought going in that 75 to 80 miles a day would be a good pace."

While numerous existing routes exist for cross-country riding, Sobotta elected instead to blaze his own trail when he set off on June 25. Paving his own way has had its fair share of 50 to 60 mile stretches between towns, but Sobotta said he has stayed hydrated and prepared for the road ahead. He is riding a Surly long haul trucker model with a small trailer for his belongings, which also features a solar panel to charge his phone. The journey was arduous during uphill and inclement weather days, but Sobotta said he stayed determined.

"I have this feeling of just wanting to move the checker down the game board," Sobotta said. The discoveries he has made along the way have also made traversing off the beaten path well worth it in Sobotta's experience. "You see so many more things at 14 miles per hour than you do at 70. So many places you wouldn't think to stop at," Sobotta said. "I had the best omelette I've ever had at a place called the Melstone Cafe Bar Casino, which also houses the public library."

through his old stomping grounds to ride through Trempealeau County late last month. "I had to pinch myself, all of a sudden I felt like I was riding on roads I have ridden a hundred times before with old friends," Sobotta said. "It was great catching up with them, and I had to remind myself I was on a trans-American trip." Sobotta hardly took a day

off since he started, going the first 17 days straight before his first complete day off. Camping at night has also been the regular routine. "I hope that for those in Independence today that are 18 years-old and have dreams, they know that there will be a day you can do it," Sobotta said. "I'll be 62 in a couple days. I was thinking about this in 1976 and finally got around to it."

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Blair-Taylor school board votes to go to referendum

Blair-Taylor School District voters will be able to decide if they want the school to add classrooms and build both a daycare center and baseball field on school property at the Nov. 3 election.

Last week Monday, the district school board voted 6-1, with director Blaine Koxlien opposed, in favor of a referendum asking district residents to allow the district to borrow an amount not to exceed \$4,145,000 to be used for paying the cost of school building improvements including the aforementioned projects.

At a special meeting on Aug. 3, superintendent Jeff Eide presented the board with the results of a survey that showed 63.6 percent of the 267 respondents favored sending the project to a referendum.

In that meeting it was stated that the board acknowledged the financial difficulties of many families dealing with the COVID-19 pandemic, but thought it was a good time to secure financing for the projects because

of low interest rates.

Eide said that the board had planned on refinancing the current school building in 2022, which would add three years to the current term, but would not increase the projected debt service levy.

In other business at last week's meeting, Eide reported to the board that the district had purchased a UVC unit that was advertised as having the ability to kill 99.5 percent of all viruses. Eide said they would be testing the unit before using it when school begins.

The board also approved the hires of Samantha Anderson, elementary special education paraprofessional; Jessica Mikesell, middle and high school special education paraprofessional and Emily Granlund, special education paraprofessional

at all three levels.

The resignation of food service employee Pat Hertzfeldt was also accepted.

The board also heard from elementary school principal Lynn Halverson who said the district had decided to split up its 4K and Early Learning Center students into two groups. Halverson said the district was to have 53 new students in the ELC and decided to split them and have half the group come on Mondays and Tuesdays and the other half come on Thursdays and Fridays with Wednesdays being used to sanitize the classrooms.

The students were previously scheduled to come to school for half of a day four times a week. Halverson said having them attend two full days would better prepare them for kindergarten.

BRF man arrested for abducting child in Taylor


The threat of child abduction hit close to home last week as Bernard Stubrud, 67, of Black River Falls was arrested for abducting a nine-year-old girl in Taylor on Thursday.

The child was reported missing and possibly abducted from Hanson Street in Taylor. According to a release sent by the Jackson County Sheriff's Department, it was reported that the female got into an older model Chevrolet truck with an older male subject, possibly in his 60s.

The child was located by a grandparent several blocks away from the reported abduction site. She was with Stubrud, who left the scene before a deputy could arrive.

Stubrud and his truck were then located by a conservation warden on County Highway C several miles east of Taylor. Deputies responded and questioned him about what occurred. It was determined that he was the person involved in the incident. Stubrud was then arrested for child abduction and criminal trespassing.

The Jackson County Sheriff's Office said the case was still under investigation as of late last week.

Whitehall fire station roof may need repair

Whitehall could be facing a hefty bill for another roof for its 22-year-old fire station.

Fire chief Jeremiah Pientok told the city council last Tuesday that a helicopter recently blew off portions of the roof, revealing water damage. Cost for repairs could range from \$30,000 to correct just damaged areas, to as much as \$200,000 if the entire roof has to be replaced.

The council will consider what to do about the structure during budget deliberations this fall.

The structure's original shingle roof had already been repaired with the overlay of a metal roof. Pientok said the damage appears to be caused by water wicking back up from the edge of the metal sheets.

"I guess the helicopter did us a favor before it got much worse," said Mayor Jeff Hauser.

The council renewed for a year the lease of a building on Main Street that is the temporary home of the Whitehall Public Library, but did not adopt a proposal by council Julie Edison that the lease put more of the maintenance work back on the property owner.

The lease raises the library's monthly rent from \$775 for the first year to \$800 this year. The library is in the process of fund-raising for a new building to be located at the corner of Ellis and Seranton streets.

The lease makes the library responsible for maintenance up to \$700 and Edison argued that the library paying for any repairs "is not reasonable." Her motion to negotiate the clause did not get a second.

City administrator Ashley Slaby said the building has not required a lot of repairs.

Council member Kurt Johnson again called on the council to consider an ordinance similar to one in Arcadia that places restrictions on the number of cars that can be parked on residential lots.

"Take a look around," Johnson said. "There are places with six vehicles in the yard."

Slaby said parking restrictions my bump up against the lots in the city that don't conform to zoning rules.

"You get a family with teens and grandparents, and you're going to have a lot of cars," Slaby said.

In response to citizen complaints reported by council member Barb Mathson, Slaby said maintenance at Larson Park is being done routinely but that ball fields are not getting special attention because they are not being used this year.

Mathson also said there have also been complaints of threatening dogs running loose in the city. Slaby said city ordinance requires dogs be restrained and that residents can notify police about violations. City clerk and Treasurer Karen Witte said residents can also ask the city to send a letter to an offending dog owner.

Another community testing site planned in Arcadia

The Trempealeau County Health Department has planned its fourth COVID-19 community testing site and second in Arcadia, to be held this Saturday.

Arcadia was home to the first community testing site on May 20 where 180 people were tested with five positive results. It wasn't until July, however, that the pandemic began hammering the area. Two community testing sites were held in the month of July, 158 tests were administered at Eleva-Strum High School on July 13 with 18 positive results. On July 28, 121 tests were administered at Blair-Taylor High School with 12 positive results.

Community testing returns to Arcadia High School, 756 Raider Drive, on Saturday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. with

the county health department, county emergency management team and the Wisconsin National Guard on hand to administer tests.

The COVID-19 testing event is for any Wisconsin resident age five or older experiencing at least one symptom of COVID-19. Symptoms of COVID-19 can be mild and include: fever, cough, shortness of breath or difficulty breathing, chills, repeated shaking with chills, muscle pain, headache, sore throat, nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, or new loss of taste or smell.

Testing also is available for anyone who has been in contact with someone who tested positive for COVID-19. Testing will be done by nasal swab and there is no cost to participate. Event organizers ask that all community members wear a mask at this event to protect the staff collecting information.

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G-E-T teachers react to reopening plan

As students prepare to return to school, teachers are working to implement new protocols to keep pupils and educators as safe as possible.

In the Gale-Etrick-Trempealeau school district, teachers concede that there are kinks to be worked out, but that they are working in close partnership with administration and the school board to support students and staff.

"COVID-19 has presented public education a set of challenges few of us could ever have imagined," middle school teacher and district teacher's union president Laura Knutson said. "Understandably, there are questions and logistical details that continue to be 'works in progress,' especially given the ever-evolving conditions and guidance from health experts.

One of those challenges, according to elementary teacher and union rep Jared McCutchen is supporting learners equitably.

"Finding the time to make sure your virtual learners have the same support as your face-to-face learners is going to be a challenge," McCutchen said. "We need to make sure that the students that opted to be virtual are getting what they need, so when they do come back face-to-face it's a seamless transition for them."

He added that particularly at the elementary level, he anticipates keeping children engaged will be more of a challenge as well.

"The classroom will not

look anything like it usually does," McCutchen said. "Students not being able to eat lunch with a friend from the other class or play outside during recess with them will be difficult."

Furniture removal and plexiglass installation across district buildings has been common as teachers seek to maximize space for social distancing within classrooms. Recommendations

In general, McCutchen said flexibility as teachers guide students through new norms will be one of their biggest challenges as educators in the 2020-21 school year.

"Students will need a lot more social/emotional support, and we will spend a lot of time making sure those needs are met this year, especially this fall," McCutchen said. "Kids are very resilient, and are starved for just some social interaction with their peers, so creating that positive school and classroom atmosphere early is going to be more crucial than any year before."

City, town negotiating more annexation costs

Almost five years since it began, the court case between the city of Whitehall and town of Lincoln over an annexation has been concluded, but the two municipalities are still negotiating about money.

Town chairman Jack Speerstra said he will be discussing with the town board in September a proposal from the city for property taxes and road aid money due from the 1,248-acre annexation that was invalidated by the Wisconsin Supreme Court.

The Whitehall city council met in closed session last Wednesday with their attorney on the town's successful annexation challenge. Mayor Jeff Hauser said he could not comment on the deliberations.

The annexation in 2015 was done at the request of the now-defunct Whitehall Sand and Rail which planned to open a sand mine on the acreage.

The city "did some road work" on a washout on a road within the dispute land, but the town needs the bulk of the road aid for its long-term maintenance efforts, Speerstra said.

Speerstra said the amount of property tax and road aid under contention is in the mid-\$30,000.

The lawsuit by Lincoln against the annexation was dismissed in July by Pepin County Superior Court Judge Thomas Clark. As part of that settlement, the city agreed to pay Lincoln about \$80,000 for attorney fees. In the spring of 2019, the state supreme court found that the city's annexation failed to get unanimous approval from all the affected property owners and nixed the expansion of city boundaries.

The reversal of the annexation meant Whitehall council member and resident of the annexed land, Amy Schaub, no longer qualified for the council. The Ward One council member is now Julie Edison.

Participate in gun deer hunt for hunters with disabilities

Eligible disabled hunters hoping to participate in the 2020 gun deer hunt for hunters with disabilities must contact a hunt sponsor to sign up before Sept. 1.

As of the June 1 sponsor application deadline, 76 sponsors have enrolled over 70,000 acres of land across 41 counties for this year's hunt, which will take place Oct. 3-11. For a complete list of 2020 sponsors, please visit dnr.wi.gov.

"We are very grateful to the sponsors that are willing to provide opportunities for hunters with disabilities," said Matthew Gross, Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Assistant Big Game Ecologist. "Giving hunters access to over 70,000 acres of land is instrumental in making this unique opportunity a success and continuing Wisconsin's deer hunting tradition."

Eligible hunters may sign up for one property per year and must possess a gun deer license.

Hunters or assistants must contact sponsors directly to sign up for a hunt. Hunters must provide their name, contact information and DNR customer ID number. To be eligible, hunters must possess a valid Class A, C or D disabled permit or Class B permit that is issued for longer than one year, authorizing shooting from a stationary vehicle.

It is important for hunters to note that some properties can accommodate more hunters than others, so hunters are advised to contact potential sponsors as early as possible to determine if space is available.

 Construction on Tri-County Memorial Hospital's proposed expansion and renovation project apparently will start next month, almost a year after it was originally hoped it would begin. The hospital's \$3 million-plus "Building for the Future" project. Was proposed in the summer of 1993, unveiled later that year and expected to get underway in the fall of 1994. But delays caused by state certification requirements, changes in the scope of the plan and other factors pushed back the start of actual construction several times.

A former manager, charged with embezzling money from the defunct A-G Cooperative, won't be tried in the county where the co-op was a fixture for nearly 70 years. Jackson County Circuit Judge Robert Radcliffe last week granted a change of venue motion filed by the attorney for Claretton Smith. The former A-G general manager is charged with one count of felony theft by embezzlement for allegedly diverting more than \$100,000 in co-op funds for his own use and that of his son.

The Whitehall School District has four interns at the high school this year and one practicing teacher in middle school, including Sharlene Prinson, JoAnne Freeman, Michael LeBourton, Debbie Larson and Rick Hudson.

The construction of the new connector wing at St. Joseph's Hospital began recently. The \$350,000 project is expected to link all five aspects of the Arcadia Health System together as the medical facility takes the continued steps toward integration. It is expected to be completed next February.

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Ashley Furniture sponsors Virtual summer STEM camps

Despite the cancellation of many summer activities this year, local students still enjoyed virtual summer camps thanks to Ashley Furniture Industries, Inc. (Ashley). After three successful years of sponsoring STEM summer camps at local schools, this year's need to continue the program was significant to keep students engaged and learning throughout the summer months.

Ashley Furniture and the school districts of Arcadia, Gale-Etrick-Trempealeau and Independence developed a plan to provide a virtual STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) learning experience for elementary and middle school students. Using a pocket-sized, multi-functional programming tool called a Micro:bit, students and teachers were able to safely learn coding and programming through an online format at home.

The two-week camp, which had 86 participants between the three schools, was structured in conjunction with the schools' existing summer school programs—similarly as past years. This year, however, participants picked up kits the week before the camp that included materials they would need to complete projects at home, including school-issued laptops.

Ashley's \$10,000 financial contribution allowed students who participated in the program to keep their Micro:bit free of charge. As part of the partnership, training sessions were also provided by Fox Valley Technical College to allow the teaching staff the opportunity to become familiar with the coding and programming capabilities of the Micro:bits. The school districts of Blair-Taylor and Whitehall, who also received donated equipment, have plans to incorporate the Micro:bits into their middle school class curriculum later this year.

Although instructors had to adapt a new format and were unable to assist with projects in person, students successfully programmed their end-projects: a wearable activity tracker complete with flashing emoticons, a beating heart light display, and a working step-counter.

"This year's offering was fantastic as it provided a great learning opportunity for our students," said Alene Horton, Instructional Technology Coordinator at G-E-T School District. "One parent reached out and thanked me for bringing a smile back to her daughter who absolutely loved this camp."

Floodplain ordinance approved in Trempealeau

The wait may be nearly over for Trempealeau residents living within the floodplain waiting to make improvements to their homes beyond 50 percent of the value of the property.

At a special meeting of the Trempealeau village board on Thursday, the board unanimously approved the latest revised version of ordinance

#3-2020 after a public hearing was held. The ordinance negates the 50 percent limit for nonconforming buildings below the floodplain, as long as the improvements or modifications raise the entire structure to a conforming level above the floodplain.

The ordinance takes effect after the close of business on Sept. 2, or as soon as the village receives confirmation of approval from the Department of Natural Resources, whichever comes first. Upon receiving approval from the DNR, the village can then begin reviewing and issuing construction permits. Village planning and zoning director Roxroy Barrett said he had been in touch with FEMA and the DNR, who have both provided feedback in the process, prior to the meeting and expected no further resistance.

"They are okay with it as currently written, it is just the formality of going through the process. They are given copies

of it so they can sign and we can move forward," Barrett said.

The village's approval appears to close the book on a process that began more than five months ago, after the state legislature passed a corresponding bill into law negating the 50 percent rule on March 3. Barrett acknowledged that while communication between the village and the DNR and FEMA has not always been timely, the village has worked to meet the requests of the other parties.

"All indications are that they wanted to be helpful and cooperative with us," Barrett said. "They've been responsive with us, and we've worked together to come up with a good amended ordinance that will be beneficial for those in the floodplain area."

Barrett added that he hopes the ordinance can also serve as a model ordinance for other communities that are also

working with the DNR and FEMA. He said the village began their process prior to the agencies developing their own model ordinance, due in part to previous experiences with the agencies not moving at a pace to their liking. Specifically, the village was not pleased with the communication around a recent Community Assistance Visit (CAV) report from FEMA that had to do with the National Flood Insurance Program.

"DNR and FEMA have their own processes in place, they're large organizations and things don't typically happen as quickly as we may want them to. Based on the previous experience with the CAV report, we wanted to take a more proactive approach," Barrett said.

While Barrett called the tentative agreement a "win-win" that the village was happy with, one resident affected by the amended ordinance is not ready for a victory lap.

"We are not going to get our hopes up until we see the signed documents from the DNR. This is the second time the board has approved the new village ordinance, just to have it overruled by the DNR (the first time)," said Deb Ondell, a property owner within the floodplain who has followed the issue closely over the past several months especially.

"We won't celebrate until we're holding a building permit, and that won't be possible until the first part of September," Ondell said.

Fall sports on in DC, CC

Announcements from the Dairyland and Coulee Conferences this past week indicate both will pursue fall sports in the coming weeks, with the exception of football in the Coulee.

The Dairyland issued a release on behalf of all of their member schools saying football, volleyball and cross country will go on, while Arcadia and Gale-Etrick-Trempealeau both made individual statements saying their fall sports except for football will be conducted in the fall.

Start dates for the Dairyland listed in their release included first practices on Aug. 17 for cross country, Sept. 7 for volleyball and Sept. 14 for football, with competitions potentially as early as this week for cross country, a Sept. 12 scrimmage for volleyball and a Sept. 25 scrimmage for football. Schedules for individual teams had not been released as of press time, but the release specified that they will adhere to a conference-only schedule across the three sports. Conference standings and championships are also suspended in the Dairyland for 2020, due to the uncertainty over the number of games each team may play.

In their individual release, Arcadia said their district has tentative schedules in place for girl's golf as well as girls and boys cross country after each team began practices on Aug. 17. Boys soccer and girls volleyball are scheduled

to begin on Sept. 8, with schedules to be finalized. Soccer however may be moved to spring if the team cannot fill an adequate schedule to justify a fall season.

Arcadia and G-E-T announced they would move football to the modified spring offering provided by the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association, which begins with practices on March 8.

While additional details for the Coulee Conference were not made available by press time on Monday, the Dairyland released several conference-wide measures concerning fan attendance among other concerns.

Each player in a given Dairyland athletic event will

be provided with four tickets that are non-transferable to minimize fan attendance. Those tickets will also feature a reminder that face masks will be required of all indoor sport attendees, as well as outdoor attendees when social distancing is not possible. Dairyland schools will also make efforts to live-stream games, and the gate fee for fall sports has been eliminated to maintain social distancing. No concessions will be made available as well.

The Dairyland release went on to say that additional information on protocols for athletes or entire teams sitting out of competition will be released as event dates get closer.

Brennaman Not in a Judgement-Free Zone

While I know that just as the sun will rise tomorrow, the public shaming monster will have found a new victim by the time this column publishes, I want to pause on a story from last week.

Cincinnati Reds broadcaster Thom Brennaman took the heat off the players in the Fernando Tatis unwritten rules debate by violating the biggest unwritten rule in broadcasting: the mic is always hot. His use of a homophobic slur during a pregame broadcast was abhorrent, and his attempt at an apology while trying to simultaneously call a home run during the broadcast rang hollow.

I don't know Brennaman or what's in his heart, and likewise I know even I can be more sensitive in the language I use so as not to be offensive to members of the LGBTQ+ community in particular. However, what felt most unacceptable in the apology in my mind other than the cliché "sorry to anyone who was offended," was the use of "I pride myself and think of myself as a man of faith."

As a fellow "man of faith," I take issue with the relevancy of this assertion in this apology. It almost feels like a dog whistle to other Christians to come to his defense in a sort of "we're all sinners so who's to judge," kind of way. Side note: the real irony of Brennaman's home run call/apology is the ball sails by a sign reading "Judgement-free zone" as he's speaking. What frustrates me about this however is how low Brennaman is setting the bar for "people of faith."

And while we may not have the authority reserved for his creator to judge his soul, uttering such a slur with such mocking contempt as he did is not excusable or dismissible to any decent employer. The confidence with which he could say something like that in the workplace should also be a red flag, pun unintended, of the culture at Fox Sports Ohio. Interviews should be conducted with each member of the production crew to determine if others contribute to the environment Brennaman revealed with his comment.

Just after finishing his home run call, he went on to seemingly lament that he may never put on the broadcasting headset again, showing greater remorse over his own consequences than those he may have offended. Shortly thereafter, Fox Sports suspended Brennaman from Reds and National Football League broadcasts, as they should have.

None of us are perfect, and should thus not be held to that standard. However, Brennaman's case goes beyond a lack of perfection towards willful ignorance, for which his employer and the general public have every right to hold him to account.

Arcadia acknowledges its flood project obligations

Arcadia officials passed a last-minute acknowledgement that, yes, they know they would have to pay for the flood control project being proposed by federal engineers.

The city found out during a recent visit of officials with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers that the document, a "self-certification of financial capability," had not been completed, according to city administrator Chad Hawkins. It does not commit the city to the project.

Hawkins told the council last Wednesday that the document is a requirement before the corps will authorize as complete a study identifying flood control projects for Turton Creek and the Trempealeau River.

The resolution notes the city has \$14 million in state funds and less than \$10 million in federal money to finance

the \$37 million project. The city is unsure from where the balance of the money, which exceeds Arcadia's borrowing limit, would come.

The council rejected a proposal to cut down supports for an incomplete shelter at the city pool, opting instead to wait to see if the city can afford the perhaps \$15,000 cost of constructing a pergola.

The city planning commission recommended cutting off the supports and placing picnic tables with umbrellas on what was once a sandy patch near the pool.

"I'd prefer a pergola," said council member Marlys Kolstad. She, and council members Dan Sonsalla, Kevin Mayzek and Paul Anderson voted to delay removing the columns.

Mayor Rob Reichwein said he and Police Chief Diana Anderson would visit the neighborhood of Marie Jasso,

who complained at the meeting that the entire length of the curb in front of her home has been painted yellow as a no-parking zone.

"If I can't park there, I'm going to have to carry groceries another 100 feet," Jasso said.

The council also approved a survey map for construction of a commercial development proposed by John Krage and Jason Lockington near the intersection of Detloff and Blaschko. Lockington said the project will likely get underway next year.

The council endorsed the city applying for federal money to help cover the extra expenses of holding an election during a pandemic. City clerk Angela Berg said the city will be reimbursed for items such as plexiglass shields and the costs of the "huge increase" in requests for absentee ballots.
