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COVID-19: New county record set for deaths

As Trempealeau County continues to see a high number of new COVID-19 cases, a record for the amount of deaths from the virus was set last week with six.

The 239 new cases reported in the county by the Wisconsin Department of Health Services were the third highest total recorded in a given week as roughly 48 percent of the county residents who were tested received positive results. More significant, however, is that six county residents died from the virus last week, breaking the previous record of five deaths, set two weeks ago, and bringing the county's total to 22, according to the Trempealeau County Health Department.

Despite the increasing number of cases and deaths, the county board of supervisors has not yet scheduled a meeting to discuss a possible ordinance change that would allow health officials to fine county residents and visitors for not wearing masks when in public spaces. The county's board of health recommended such a measure on Nov. 18 after the county's health director Barb Barczak issued an order requiring face coverings in public spaces. Since that day, there have been 11 deaths and 695 more new cases in the county.

The death total could continue to climb. The county has seen a significant increase in the number of cases amongst its elderly population in recent weeks. Since Nov. 18, there have been 130 new cases amongst county residents 60 years old or older, including 38 amongst residents who are 80 or older. The county health department announced 18 county residents were hospitalized as of Monday.

With the case increase the last few weeks, the county has jumped into the top 10 in terms of cases per 100,000, according to the DHS.

Car crashes into Trempealeau Community Center

The Village of Trempealeau Community Center will undergo some repairs after a vehicle crashed through one of the walls Thursday afternoon.

A gold 2000 Chrysler Cirrus LXI had to be extracted from the building — located on 3rd Street in the village — after its driver, Donna Parkhurst,

86, of Trempealeau, backed into the community center shortly after 1 p.m., according to a police report. Parkhurst had been backing out of the Bluff View Bank parking lot before striking the building.

Parkhurst was listed on the report as possibly being injured, though she did not receive medical attention.

The report said she was confused, but neither drug nor alcohol use was

suspected.

An eyewitness said the collision sounded like a bomb going off when the vehicle hit the building at approximately 1:14 p.m.

The portion of the community center that was damaged was a room occupied by the Trempealeau Historical Society. The building also houses the Trempealeau village government offices.

State will appeal sex abuse case dismissal

Just a couple of months short of the six-year anniversary of when James Killian was first charged with child sex abuse, the state department of justice is asking the state appeals court to review the dismissal of charges against the Independence man.

State Attorney General Joshua Kaul notified the state appeals court last Wednesday that the department would appeal a decision by Trempealeau County Circuit Court Judge Rian Radtke that the latest charges against Killian, 60, of 39243 Jimmy Lane should be dropped because they were unconstitutional double jeopardy.

The appeals court can decide whether to take

the case, a process that can take weeks. The state department of justice had not as of Monday filed a document outlining their arguments for why the dismissals should be reversed.

In his decision Oct. 18, Radtke found that the 2019 case brought against Killian included the same facts and covered the same time period as the case that ended in a mistrial in 2018.

During that 2018 trial, Jackson County Circuit Court Judge Anna Becker ended Killian's trial after finding that then-Trempealeau County District Attorney Taavi McMahon was guilty of prosecutorial overreach. Her ruling was made "with prejudice," meaning the charges against Killian could not be

brought again.

In the 2019 case, Shelly Rusch, an assistant attorney general and a special prosecutor in the Killian case, argued that the allegations against Killian involved new facts, covered a different time period and hence did not constitute double jeopardy. She charged Killian with 10 felonies of sexual abuse, incest and repeated abuse of a child. Radtke's ruling against her is the one pending before the appeals court.

In his ruling, Radtke said he was "sympathetic to the victims" but he was obliged to dismiss the charges because of McMahon's "egregious conduct." The alleged abuse by Killian reportedly occurred between 1994 and 1998, according to court documents.

A charge of repeated sexual abuse of a child was first brought against Killian in March, 2015. Additional felony charges of incest and child sexual abuse in 2016 were added to the 2015 case. That combined case was brought to trial until 2018.

Hearing transcripts filed recently from the combined case show, during a hearing in June of 2017, that Becker then was highly critical of McMahon for not being prepared for the prosecution of Killian. She leveled the same charges against him in March of 2018, and declared a mistrial when McMahon allowed testimony from a child that Becker had repeatedly forbidden. McMahon was later removed from office in a recall.



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County going forward with disputed voting machines

The county's top election official said he is confident in the performance of the disputed Dominion voting machines and that 26 will be in place in county municipalities by February. County clerk Paul Syverson said Monday he thinks his trust will be validated when he audits the two machines in use in the county, in

Unity and Arcadia. Syverson said he asked the state election commission if he could add the Dominion devices to an audit the state requested of Trempealeau County voting machines and was told he could do so after Dec. 14, the date electoral college delegates meet to cast their states' votes that could determine whether Joe Biden succeeds Donald Trump. Syverson said he has

no reservations about the Dominion voting machines, which have been questioned by public officials and supporters of President Trump who contend the machines may be responsible for some of the alleged irregularities in the Nov. 3 general election. County municipalities will install 25 new \$7,660 Dominion machines, with Arcadia keeping its just

two-year-old machine. The \$191,500 the municipalities will spend on the Dominion machines will be entirely covered by the federal CARES act, the emergency funding program established to help the nation during the pandemic, Syverson said. "I am not at all concerned," Syverson said, citing company documents and an article written by the CEO of Dominion that was

published in the Wall Street Journal. Trump carried Arcadia by 491 votes to Democrat nominee Biden's 348. In Unity, Trump received 203 votes and Biden, 112. Trump carried the county with 8,833 votes compared to Biden's 6,258. "Look at this," he said, showing a logo someone had sent him. The image showed the Dominion logo with a

red arrow entering a ballot box and a blue arrow emerging, the implication that Republican votes entered the Dominion machine and Democratic ones emerged. "The actual logo isn't like that," Syverson said, showing an official Dominion document with a logo that shows just one red arrow entering the ballot box.

Independence ice fishing contest likely to be held

Ice fishing contest organizers told the Independence city council that they will likely host a modified version of the annual event. Mike Blaha, president of the Elk Rod and Gun Club, told the council Monday that the changes the club is considering include moving most activities to drive-through or, perhaps, walk-through and eliminating any location where individuals might gather. The city council, which will issue permits for the event, generally appeared to support the changes.

"We have to bring back some kind of normalcy," said Mayor Robert Baecker. "We've got to try to get some things back." The club typically holds the contest and jamboree on the first Saturday of February. Blaha said Barb Barczak, Trempealeau County health director, would not condone the event, but did offer guidance on how to keep the contest and jamboree safe. The club was to meet this week to establish more

details. "She wanted eight feet of (social distancing), instead of six, so we settled on seven," Blaha said. He said a survey the club conducted online and at local businesses netted "57 responses, all of them positive." He noted too that the Department of Natural Resources is issuing ice fishing permits. In other action, the council approved moving forward with \$1.3 million in borrowing for the city's participation in a phosphorous-abatement water quality trading project. Under the terms of the arrangement, the city pays for upstream projects to reduce the introduction of phosphorous into waterways in exchange for not having to do even more costly treatment of water. The council also adopted the \$1.415 million 2021 budget that raises the mill rate from \$8.67 per \$1,000 of assessed value to \$8.75. The

city's 2020 budget totaled \$1.448 million. The council adopted new covenants for the tax incentive district-financed Markham Hillside Addition that require tree planting and certain appearance standards on homes built in the development. The new restrictions also set rules for renters occupying homes while they are being sold. Council members agreed to pay Gerke Excavating \$231,301 for the company's work on the development infrastructure. The city retained a higher portion of the overall project cost for a final payment until the company remedies some aspects of its work, probably in the spring. Baecker said some of the company's fixes so far have been "excellent." The council also requested that individuals interested in Markham Hillside Addition lots where multi-family houses will be allowed give a presentation on their proposal.

In other business, the council: Voted three-to-two to pay \$3,300 for concrete work at a city pavilion. Council members objected to Baecker authorizing use of a business to do the work after the Lions Club initially said it would get volunteers to complete the project. "I don't like this," said member David Galewski, who eventually voted to OK the payment. Baecker said he may have erred in authorizing the work, but did so because it was getting too late in the year for further delays. Council members Rich Theisen and Jason Ekern voted no. Will consider using a private company to sweep city streets twice a year at roughly \$7,000 annually. The city otherwise would have to purchase a machine, use city staff to drive it and maintain it at an estimated higher cost. Approved the final payment of \$143,426 to Erickson Excavating for street and utility work on Madison Street and a \$54,590 payment to J.R. Jurowski for work on the Third Street alley. Agreed to appoint Tom Jensen to the utility commission.

As of Monday, the county has the sixth-highest rate in the state, behind Menominee, Dodge, Jackson, Shawano and Brown counties. The county's fatality percentage was the same as the state percentage, 0.9.

Last week, the DHS officials announced a change to its recommendations for quarantining. Officials previously recommended quarantining for a full 14 days after having contact with a person who tested positive for COVID-19, but now recommends quarantining for 10 days should the person not be tested or seven days after receiving a negative test result.

The DHS also announced changes to its website, allowing for more specific

State residents can now search COVID-19 data based on municipality, school district or zip code. As of Monday, the area with the highest number of positive cases was people with an Arcadia (54612) zip code with 659 cases, followed by Osseo, 399; Trempealeau, 297; Galesville, 290; Eleva, 252; Whitehall, 233; Independence, 193; Blair, 176; Strum, 143 and Ettrick, 133.

Those residing within the Arcadia School District have seen the most cases with 706 followed by, G-E-T, 680; Osseo-Fairchild, 422; Whitehall, 329; Blair-Taylor, 297; Eleva-Strum, 255 and Independence, 202.

Because this was the first week that such information was made available by the DHS, a week-by-week comparison is not yet available.

25 YEARS AGO Dec. 14, 1995

Despite all the problems the city of Whitehall has had with its swimming pool the past few years, city officials have maintained that replacing the facility would be too expensive. Building a new pool or renovating the existing one hasn't gotten any cheaper. But as of Tuesday night, one of those options is definitely more doable. The legal representatives for an anonymous donor appeared at the city council's regular meeting Tuesday with an offer that the city probably can't refuse. The donor is offering the city the principal and income from a trust fund to pay part of the cost of building a new pool, or renovating the existing pool. The total currently in the fund is \$105,081.95.

A 19-year-old man has been sentenced to prison for holding a gun on his father during a robbery attempt. Cody Fernholz pleaded guilty in Trempealeau County Circuit Court Oct. 24 to armed robbery and aggravated battery, both as a party to the crime. As a result, Judge John Damon sentenced Fernholz to seven years in state prison on the armed robbery count with a five-year probation to be served after his release.

In the five years that the Whitehall Area Chamber of Commerce has held the Festival of Trees, participants have had to put up with cold weather or snowy conditions a couple of times, but never both of them at once, or in such extremes. Friday's near-blizzard conditions resulted in the cancellation for the first time of the parade that kicks the annual Christmas promotion of, and apparently impacted festival events held on Saturday as well.

The communities of Blair and Taylor, school friends and staff donated money for the purchase. Bush was injured in a car accident last October and, at the time, his jacket was cut off by emergency personnel upon extracting and aiding him at the scene of the crash.

The Whitehall High School Student Council is sponsoring a contest, open to area residents and WHS students and graduates, to name the new high school building which is to be completed during the spring of 1971. The council will chose five of the names from among those entered for approval by the school board, and the student body will make the final selection.

Arcadia's new sewage lagoon went into full operation Dec. 7. Since then, sewage and industrial wastes from the entire city and the A-G broiler plant are pumped into the lagoon at approximately 800 gallons per minute.

A funeral service for Joseph Pietrek Jr., 35, a former Arcadia resident who was killed in a two-car crash near Neillsville Thursday afternoon was held Monday

at St. Michael's Catholic Church in North Creek. Arcadia Chief of Police Edward Kaiser reported that three recent break-ins and entries in the city have been solved with the apprehension of six juveniles from Arcadia. Children of the entire Whitehall trading area will be entertained at a Christmas party on Saturday, Sept. 22. The entertainment will include a free movie at the Pix Theatre. Manager J.L. Johnson says that, in order to accommodate the children, only those who can view the show unattended will be admitted. In previous years, many adults have accompanied their children, which has resulted in a crowded condition.

The first carload of honey ever to be shipped from the Green Bay and Western Railroad station at Whitehall left Monday for Lima, Ohio. It included 46,809 pounds of the product raised by Henry Schaefer of the town of Hale, who has about 1,000 colonies

in this area, plus those he keeps in the Red River Valley at Oklee, Minn. The Green Bay station is a busy place these days, sending out three to four tank-loads of milk and cream a day from the Land O' Lakes plant, in addition to the usual run of business.

Preliminary plans for staging a Homecoming Community Dance were made at the monthly meeting of the Hutchins-Stendahl American Legion Post Tuesday. The dance will be sponsored by the World War II veterans, who now make up at least half the membership of the post here.

Richard Rumsch of Minneapolis, a salesman for a barber supply house who was in town Saturday on business, says that Whitehall was the first town on his route that was decorated for the holiday season.

Women Raising The Bar In Sports

Women have waited long enough for their opportunities to break through in male-dominated sports leagues, and some significant strides have been made in recent weeks.

Those following developments across the NFL, MLB and NCAA in over the past month have probably caught wind of the names Kim Ng, Sarah Fuller and Callie Brownson.

On Nov. 13, Ng became the first female general manager of a Major League Baseball club, taking the helm of the Miami Marlins. Her experience more than qualified her for the position, as she has had 30 years in baseball. Ng's impressive resume includes three World Series titles with the Yankees while rising to the rank of assistant GM at only age 29. She also worked for a number of years with the Los Angeles Dodgers as vice president and assistant GM, and spent the last 10 years as senior vice president of baseball operations for Major League Baseball.

League commissioner Robert Manfred, for all his noted faults previously discussed in this column space, did manage to encompass the gravity of the historic achievement in a statement the day of the hire.

"Kim's appointment makes history in all of professional sports and sets a significant example for the millions of women and girls who love baseball and softball," Manfred said in part. Her achievement would

not be the only historic milestone for women in male-dominated sports this past month, as Fuller and Brownson each made an impact at field level as well. Brownson followed Cleveland Browns tight ends coach Drew Petzing, whose wife gave birth to the couple's first child the day prior. Brownson had been a full-time coaching intern with the Buffalo Bills before joining Cleveland prior to this season as chief of head coach Kevin Stefanski's staff. In an article about the hiring from last January on the Browns' website, Stefanski said Brownson would be "involved in every aspect" of their football operations through the role.

"Callie is uniquely situated where she can go interact with the football ops or PR or the locker room or the equipment room. She's really the liaison to the rest of the building for me. I'm going to lean on her heavily and already have," Stefanski said.

That quote came to pass again on Nov. 29 as the Browns defeated the Jacksonville Jaguars in Brownson's debut as the first female assistant coach in NFL history. For what it's worth, Cleveland tight ends combined for four catches, 37 yards and a touchdown in the 27-25 Browns win. Cleveland has also enjoyed one of their more impressive starts in recent memory, going 8-3 over their first 11 games of the season.

The day prior to Brownson taking the NFL stage, Fuller made waves across NCAA football by becoming the first woman to play for a Power Five school in college football history. Suiing up for a Vanderbilt squad out of kickers after several Commodores were ruled out due to COVID-19 protocols, Fuller attempted one squib kickoff in an otherwise uneventful 41-0 loss to Missouri on Nov. 28. The opportunity arose from Fuller being a scholarship athlete in soccer, where she also excelled with three shutouts in nine games. She was also scheduled to kick against Georgia this past Saturday, which is after the writing of this column.

Reflecting on each of these trailblazers, I cannot help but think of the number of times each of these women, and many like them, were told they couldn't participate in the sport they wanted so passionately to pursue because of their gender. The barrier of entry for women in male-dominated sports is real and significant, as are the discrepancies in opportunities between male and female sports leagues. It extends from the field to the locker room and the press box, where regrettably even in the industry of sports journalism female writers, editors and broadcasters are not represented proportionately to population and viewer interest.

I also think about the young girls who asked their dads or brothers to turn on the Vanderbilt game to see Fuller kick, and how maybe that could prove to be the kindling for a lifelong passion for sports. Representation can matter a great deal to someone who never thought sports, or any interest, industry or hobby was for them. Providing opportunity for that doesn't have to come at any cost to the high athletic standards that come with professional and collegiate sports either.

Football's inherent violence isn't compromised by a female kicker, the tight ends in Cleveland still caught passes and the Miami Marlins can't get any worse. What is gained however in both market appeal and potential diversity of thought could not only break up the boys' club, but revolutionize the games we know and love for years to come.
