## County fair cancelled

One of the last summer dominos fell Monday evening as the 2020 Trempealeau County Fair was officially cancelled.

After posting numerous teasers for the fair throughout last week — including a post about the fair's funnel cakes on Monday morning — a decision to cancel the annual event, which was scheduled for July 16-19 this year, was announced Monday evening.

In addition to cancelling the fair, the Trempealeau County Agricultural Society said the fairgrounds itself will be closed through Aug. 31 due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

A post on the fair's social media page said: "The Trempealeau County Agricultural Society Board of Directors (Trempealeau County fair board) assessed the risk to our exhibitors, their families, our volunteers and public and determined that we are unable to host the 2020 Trempealeau County Fair. Our exhibitors and fair traditions are very important to us, but nothing is more important than the health and safety of every patron that joins us at the Trempealeau County Fair."

While they cancelled the fair, the board also announced that any youth exhibitor who would be aging out of participation this year and is enrolled in a 2020 project will be eligible to compete in 2021. The fair board will announce more details at a later date.

In conclusion, the social media post said: "This decision was extremely difficult for the Trempealeau County fair board. We want to thank our community for their support and understanding and we look forward to next year when we can be back together again at the 2021 Trempealeau County Fair July 15-18"

The cancellation of the fair comes after various other events were cancelled including Catfish Days in Trempealeau, Beef and Dairy Days in Whitehall and Ashley for the Arts in Arcadia, three events that were scheduled to take place after the fair.

## County COVID-19 cases continue to increase

With five more positive tests for COVID-19 announced on Sunday, Trempealeau County surpassed the total number of active cases in Buffalo, Jackson and La Crosse counties combined as of early this week.

The five positives on Sunday put the county's total at 19 — including 12 within a 10-day span — and the number of active cases at 14 with five having recovered since the first positive test on April 1. The county has had 1,167 negative tests. Those numbers, apparently, do not include the results of the community testing held last Wednesday in Arcadia in which 180 symptomatic individuals were tested, according to the Trempealeau County Sheriff's Department.

While Trempealeau County's cases have increased, the surrounding areas have seen a decrease. Jackson County had just one active case as of early this week with 13 of their 15 total cases having recovered and the other being a death. Buffalo County also had one death amongst its five total cases, the other four have recovered. La Crosse County had had 48 total cases with 41 of the people having recovered.

Jackson County's total appears to include the results from community testing in Black River Falls last week Tuesday, while the La Crosse County Health Department said it did not yet have the results of the community testing held in Onalaska on Thursday. Buffalo County held a community test on May 1 and had just one positive result from the 217 tested.

The county's other neighbor, Eau Claire County, has had 96 total positive tests with 59 having recovered and 3,976 negative tests.

In addition to having more current cases, Trempealeau County residents who are tested are testing positive at a higher rate (1.6 percent) than those in Buffalo (0.9), La Crosse (1.2) and Jackson (1.4) counties, but still lower than Eau Claire County (2.4). According to population data from the 2018 census, .06 percent of Trempealeau County residents have tested positive, slightly behind Jackson (.07) and Eau Claire (.09) counties, but ahead of Buffalo (.03) and La Crosse (.02).

All data regarding positive cases and total tests is from each county's social media pages or websites.

## Trempealeau to open pool, restrict patrons

The Trempealeau village board voted to open their municipal swimming pool at a special meeting held Thursday.

In accordance with Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) guidelines, the pool will develop regulations for patrons prior to their June 14 opening day. While the majority of these restrictions had yet to be es-

tablished as of last Thursday, the board did vote to restrict pool availability to residents of the village of Trempealeau who purchase season passes initially. Trempealeau pool manager Melissa Ganz did say however that the pool will work with the Trempealeau County Health Department to relax these restrictions when appropriate.

"We know this is not an ideal situation and we will do

our best to open up to more of our community as soon as we can," Ganz said.

Board members, though ultimately voting unanimously to open the pool, expressed reservations about safety and liability for both patrons and lifeguards. Other considerations discussed were the costs and obligation to taxpayers to open, whether social distancing could reasonably be expected and enforced as well as whether

campground tenants would be considered residents.

According to the CDC, there has been "no evidence" found to indicate that the virus causing COVID-19 can be spread to people through water in pools, hot tubs, spas or water play areas, due to the presence of chlorine and bromine involved in proper maintenance of these facilities.

# Whitehall district plans in-person commencement, changes in fall

Although original plans for Whitehall's class of 2020 commencement ceremony have been interrupted due to COVID-19, the district is putting together plans to have an in-person ceremony on July 25. Meanwhile, the district is tentatively planning for effects in the fall.

The district planned to have a virtual commencement ceremony on May 22, and hoped to have some type of in-person ceremony in July. The ceremony will likely take place outside.

Whitehall High School principal Eric Young said in the school board meeting last Monday that the district has worked hard to take the opinions of graduating

seniors and their families seriously.

"We've taken their opinions to heart...we've included them in every decision," Young said.

Superintendent Mike Beighley said, "the kids have done a phenomenal job not being victims. It might be that this will need to change again."

As with the graduation plans, plans for fall instruction are still taking shape. However, Beighley said that could change.

"Everything that we are hearing on the science of COVID-19 says we are in for a rocky 2020-2021 school year and certainly emotions will require a fair amount of energy to address and support," Beighley said.

Part of the new plan may involve an asynchronous

or blended model, in which sets of students will rotate between being in the classroom and working online from home. Beighley said that the hope was for the youngest students to be able to come in the fall, but that older students in middle and high school may have a change in dynamic. Although the changes may be major, Beighley said that they may bring a positive change for the district. "Crisis brings opportunity," he said.

In other matters, the board approved the retirement of long-time elementary school secretary JoAnne Foss. "What can we say about JoAnne and what she has done for so many of our school children? She will be missed," Beighley said.

# Barczak sits at center of county's virus response

The woman with the sole authority to shut down Trempealeau County because of COVID-19 also has the unenviable job of balancing the advice of health experts against the aggravation of some members of the community.

And despite her state statute-bestowed authority to do "what is reasonable and necessary for the prevention and suppression of disease," Public Health Director Barb Barczak said it is her team and other county officials who are doing the hard work of navigating how to handle the virus.

When the state supreme court on May 13 struck down the lockdown order by Gov. Tony Evers, the ruling immediately put the decision of how to handle the virus in the hands of local officials. The next day, Barczak met with advisors and decided to issue guidelines that allowed businesses to reopen.

Those suggestions included social distancing and disinfecting in all places of business. Barczak also urges individuals to wear masks when out in public.

"What puts us at risk is our behavior," Barczak said.

Barczak, who is a registered nurse, holds a bachelor of science degree in nursing and has been public health director for two years, said in an interview that the resources she had available made her response possible.

"This has been a team effort," Barczak said, citing her department's sanitarians and health educators with helping meet the demands of addressing a pandemic. The county's COVID-19 task force, which includes the sheriff, human services, a legal advisor and others, has also guided her practices, she said.

Barczak was also able to get the county's first drive-through virus testing program up and running last

week with the help of Jackson County's health department and Trempealeau and Jackson counties' emergency management directors. "We certainly couldn't have done this without the help of the National Guard," she said.

One hundred and eighty tests were administered to county residents last Wednesday. While initially just those with symptoms were tested, later in the day non-symptomatic persons were also allowed in line. Barczak said results should be back early this week. As of early this week, the county had 19 positive cases.

None of the cases of the virus have shown up in county nursing homes, Barczak said, a sharp contrast to other communities where long-term facilities have been hardest hit.

The response to COVID-19 has dominated the work and attention of the county health department since it emerged as a highly contagious bug in early March. Barczak said that year to date, the department would typically have reviewed roughly 500 reports of communicable diseases. This year that number leaped to 2,000, half of which were related to COVID-19.

Barczak has released no details about those testing positive to protect their privacy. "We live in a small community. If I give details, people are going to be able to figure out who it is," Barczak said.

She would not say how old the youngest victim is, only that "we know the virus can infect the young." She said the department has done contact tracing for all the positive cases, and urged those who may have had an interaction with an infected person to take extra precautions. Generally, she said, individuals have

cooperated.

During the time Barczak sat down to talk, her phone rang almost constantly.

She gets inquiries about how people should respond to the virus, as well as a few calls criticizing the restrictions of the health emergency. "There's really nothing I can say to change their minds," she said of the critical callers. "There are major philosophical and perspectives differences. It can be the economy versus health. I know small businesses are the heart and soul of our county. I've never had so much take-out. Instead of once every couple of months, I'm getting it two or three times a week. I want these businesses to survive."

Barczak was also working in public health during the H1N1 virus outbreak in 2009, during which about 100,000 persons died of that virus. Her most vivid memory is of administering vaccinations in the schools.

She is leery of making predictions about COVID-19, and isn't sure what metric might indicate the county is safe from the infection. Would two weeks without a new case be reassuring?

"The CDC (Centers for Disease Control) says we're in for another round in fall," Barczak said. "This is like a 1,000-piece puzzle where we don't know what the picture looks like. I'll feel better when my team is in the schools administering the vaccine."

# Arcadia offices open, park rentals delayed

Arcadia officials agreed to reopen city hall to the public, but will not be renting out space in city parks before July 1.

After those who staff city offices said they were comfortable with allowing the public to enter, the council voted last Wednesday evening four to one to reopen immediately the next day. Council member Marlys Kolsatd voted against reopening the office. Wednesday's meeting saw some members meeting in person, and others attending through an online session.

City staff member Amy Bergerson said the State Bank of Arcadia was getting "bombarded" with city business. The bank agreed to take city utility payments at its drive-through after city hall was closed to the public because of COVID-19.

"I feel like we're being selfish by not taking pay-

ments," Bergerson told the council. "I feel we have precautions in place and feel confident we can do this safely."

Mayor Rob Reichwein said the number of people visiting the bank on city business monthly, typically around 16,000, leaped to over 59,000 in April.

"I'm OK leaving this decision to the people doing the work," Reichwein said.

Visitors to city hall will be limited to one family group at a time, which would include

interpreters for those who speak Spanish. The office will be sanitized after each group.

The Arcadia Lions Club, which leases the pavilion in Memorial Park, asked the city for guidance on whether it can resume renting out the structure. Council members decided neither the Lions nor the city will be renting out park space until July 1 at the earliest.

The council also approved a building permit for an addition to the Arcadia Credit Union. The permit application estimates the addition will cost \$1 million.

Reichwein said a closed session for a "potential city hall purchase" ended with no action and was intended only to keep council member apprised of possible opportunities to replace the city's 122-year-old offices.

The board also discussed the potential for other commonly touched areas such as poolside chairs and tables as other considerations to be regularly disinfected or removed entirely. Research from the National Institutes of Health (NIH) in March also indicates that the virus can survive on hard surfaces such as plastic and stainless steel for up to 72 hours. Ultimately the board decided against allowing those who could not show proof

of Trempealeau residence from admittance to the pool, both as a means of limiting the quantity of guests and prioritizing taxpayers. Representatives from the pool at the meeting said it would take at least two-and-a-half weeks upon approval for the pool to be filled and otherwise prepared, which led to the date chosen to open. The board also voted in separate action to recommend, while not requiring, the wearing of protective face masks by village employees in service of their public duties. The Village

Hall will also open their doors to the public without an appointment necessary on June 1. In other unrelated action, the board discussed liquor license fee compensation for area businesses. After discussion of the fees, which amount to \$600 annually for many businesses, the board opted to place a consideration item for a 50 percent refund on the agenda of their next regular meeting. The board also voted to move forward with renting a dredge for the duck pond at a cost of \$2,500 a month in a motion that included the provision of not exceeding a budget of \$10,000.

## Presidential candidate hears local concerns

"It feels like rural Wisconsin gets forgotten about," Rob Grover, Trempealeau County economic development and tourism coordinator, told presidential candidate Joe Biden.

Grover was given the chance to speak with the former vice president under Barack Obama and current democratic presidential nominee as part of a round table discussion streamed online last Wednesday.

Among other concerns, Grover told the presidential candidate of issues local businesses have had to face in terms of getting funding from the Paycheck Protection Program.

"Where a lot of the anger has come from is that it seems really easy for large corporations to get the funding easy, they have teams of lawyers, teams of lobbyists connections to help bring small businesses out of the shadow of this high interest debt and debt collection agencies so you get a fresh start," Biden said. "I'll keep a close eye on the distribution of relief so it goes to the small businesses who need it, rather than the wealthy and well-connected."

Grover also told the presidential candidate that local businesses have expressed concern about re-opening to him. "They want to get open, every business wants to get people get back in and

President Donald Trump's firing of numerous officials leading their respective agencies' inspector general offices.

"We have to make sure these funds are spent fairly and transparently," Biden said.

While Biden said that small businesses are classified as businesses with 500 or fewer employees, he said he wanted to give added benefits to businesses with 50 or fewer workers.

"I'm working on new ideas to help bring small businesses out of the shadow of this high interest debt and debt collection agencies so you get a fresh start," Biden said. "I'll keep a close eye on the distribution of relief so it goes to the small businesses who need it, rather than the wealthy and well-connected."

Grover also told the presidential candidate that local businesses have expressed concern about re-opening to him.

"They want to get open, every business wants to get people get back in and

enjoy their business, but they're worried about doing it safely," Grover said. "I think we've really lacked leadership from the federal government down to the state saying 'this is our plan on how to do it safely.'"

Biden told the panel that the Center of Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) had a detailed plan, but that President Trump did not allow them to release it. Instead, Biden said, the CDC had to release a plan that was sparse on details.

Grover also said that those businesses that are planning to re-open are concerned about having personal protective equipment (PPE).

"We're at war with a virus," Biden said. "We need a commander in chief who can garner the resources and distribute the resources in ways that everybody can get them."

### 25 YEARS AGO June 1, 1995

Reynolds Tompter was presented with the Pigeon Falls Lions Club's Community Service Award while Geoffrey Johnston was the recipient of the Lion of the Year Award.

The only sure things in life are death and taxes, it is said, and a new one-half percent sales tax would appear to be a certainty for Trempealeau County. The new tax levy, after all, was approved by the county board of supervisors by a 3-1 margin May 16. But some county residents aren't taking it for granted — or taking it laying down, either. Citizens opposed to the county sales tax have called an organizational meeting for next week Tuesday in Whitehall.

The new Trempealeau County dairy princess will be chosen from among seven candidates seeking the 1995 title. The candidates include Shelby Anderson, Penny Brave, Heidi Holstad, Greta Klevgard, Amanda Ouellette, Angela Sengerstrom and Erica Waldera.

The annual Arcadia Broiler-Dairy Days had a real tough time getting off the ground this year. Endless rain showers put a real damper on the festivities. Most of the main events were cancelled, but the Memorial Day service held Sunday at the Memorial Park pavilion had a large turnout in spite of the continuous rain.

If you owned Marynook, what would you do with the 42-acre site? Well, if you're a Galesville resident, you do own Marynook, or you will as soon as the papers are signed. Mayor Terry Collins said the board and membership of the former ecumenical retreat center have accepted the city's offer of \$150,000 for the property and buildings. Collins added that he and other city officials are interested in what residents of the city would like to do with the site.

Members of the Trempealeau village board are studying a suggestion that the village sell its electric utility to another power utility. The suggestion was made by Meihael Leszcynski, superintendent of the village electric utility because of the cost of upgrading the present system to meet possible future industrial needs and because of the possibility of using proceeds from the sale to finance a pending expansion of the village waste treatment plant.

Seventeen-year-old Martha Hauser of Galesville has become the latest Gale-Etrick-Trempealeau High School graduate to be named a merit scholar and scholarship winner. Her selection, on the bases of her academic testing, will mean an early

full-tuition scholarship from Macalester College, St. Paul, valued at \$17,000 per year, for up to four years. She was one of about 6,700 scholarship winners nationwide.

G-E-T junior Ryan Quinn finished second in Division Two sectional competition on the Door Creek course in Madison Tuesday to qualify for his third consecutive trip to the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association state tournament.

### 50 YEARS AGO June 4, 1970

Democrat John Racliffe, State Assemblyman representing Jackson and Trempealeau counties, has announced that he will seek reelection. He will have opposition from Richard Elingson, Whitehall, the only Republican to announce his candidacy so far.

Cindy Hammer of rural Osseo was crowned Sunday as Trempealeau County's second dairy princess during the Arcadia Broiler-Dairy Days festival. Martha Halamma of Independence was the first runner-up.

The Arcadia Ambulance Service began operations in the city. The new ambulance service was started when the purchase of a vehicle was finalized. The new vehicle is housed at St. Joseph's Hospital.

Fishing Thursday with Donald Rice in Fountain City, Lyder caught a 17-pound, 14-ounce northern pike, a fine specimen of the big fish that inhabit the Father of Waters.

Miss Blanche Padour of Crandon has been engaged as home demonstration agent for Trempealeau County, succeeding Miss Edna Langseth, who resigned in April. Miss Padour has been teaching the past year at Taylor High School.

Henry Sygulla has nearly completed remodeling his farm residence. Henry has done as thorough a job of remodeling his farmhome as war regulations will permit.

Paul Van Horn of Chimney Rock was injured Monday while splitting wood and is now a patient at Whitehall Community Hospital. A piece of steel flew from a wedge and imbedded under his kneecap, necessitating surgery.

People of Arcadia had to

endure frost, which damaged several farmers' crops. Potatoes, tomatoes and strawberries were hard hit by the late season frost. The frost was said to be so bad it looked like a coating of snow.

Mrs. Bertha Bluth, who served as county nurse for two months in place of Miss Dorothy Willis, left May 31 to take a position as resident nurse at a paper mill factory.

### 100 YEARS AGO June 3, 1920

The beautiful ceremony of decorating soldiers' graves on Memorial Day, which has devolved upon the Grand Army of the Republic for a half-century, was this year transferred to the American Legion post. It was a successful undertaking, and the pledge given by Judge Hensel of the Sons of Veterans to H.A. Towner, the last commander of the Winfield Scott Post, G.A.R., in his dying hours, that he would see that the observance would be continued, was made good in this first effort. There was never a larger or more beautiful procession than the one that wended its way to the cemetery last Sunday. There were 11 Civil War veterans in autos, 36 members of the American Legion in uniform on foot, and several auto loads of members of the W.R.C. The band led the parade, and the school children, with flags and flowers, made this feature of the exercises exceedingly attractive.

## Cowley resigns as Arcadia girls basketball coach

Arcadia High School girls basketball coach Tom Cowley resigned last week in what he described as a decision to put his family first.

Having just completed a three-year run with the Raiders that culminated in a trip to the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association State Tournament in Division Three this past winter, Cowley said leaving the program now was a difficult decision.

"The program is in great shape, with a very good core of kids returning, good upcoming talent and some great leadership too," Cowley said. "It is always difficult to leave a team, but again, my family is always first and I felt it was the right thing to do."

A move to Onalaska will allow the Cowley family to stay closer together as Tom's wife Hanni pursues her career as a professor at University of Wisconsin-La Crosse, and their five daughters get more involved in extracurriculars.

Arcadia athletic director Bruce Schweisthal said that Cowley brought a unifying presence to the girls basketball program, and that his legacy will extend beyond the 55-17 record he compiled over his three years with the Raiders.

"The girls have learned to put team before self and when matched with a unified effort, they have realized that anything can be accomplished," Schweisthal said. "We are sad to see him leave, however we wish him well as he continues his pursuit of excellence in Onalaska."

Graduating senior and WIAA Scholar Athlete Linzy Sendelbach said Cowley helped shape her into the person she has become. "From the first day of sophomore basketball practice, he put me into a leadership role I didn't know I was going to flourish in," Sendelbach said. "He always knew how to make me do my best, whether it was on the court or in the classroom...He even

tried to talk me into applying to Harvard because he knew I was capable of going there."

Sendelbach added that Cowley's influence has also inspired her to one day pursue coaching, with the hope of one day matching wits as an opposing coach in the future.

"Although we may be going in completely different directions, I am going to forever cherish the lessons, knowledge and memories Cowley has given me. I am completely grateful I got the opportunity to meet and get to know Cowley and his incredible family," Sendelbach said. Cowley expressed gratitude for the athletes, leadership and effort he got under his tenure at Arcadia, as well as the behind-the-scenes help he received from parents such as Leslie Sendelbach, which gave him more time to focus on preparing for games. He also wanted to thank Schweisthal and former coach Paul Anderson, who each

provided him with support during his tenure. He added that his most fond memories of Arcadia will be that support from the community at large and their recent success leading to a state tournament appearance.

Cowley's career record stands at 193-177 across 16 years of varsity coaching, though his experience also includes another five years as a JV coach and one as a freshman team coach.

As for the future, Cowley said he will "absolutely" return to coaching in the next couple years.

"I have done it for a long time and hopefully will be fortunate to find a coaching position, closer to our family, within a year or two," Cowley said. "My kids and wife would definitely like to see and have me coach."

### Packers Reunion Could Be Win-Win For Daniels, Matthews

The NFL offseason dust has mostly settled as most players and teams have found their dance partners, but two notable former Green Bay Packers players are still available.

Green Bay's all-time sack leader in Clay Matthews is one of them, as the six-time Pro Bowler was cut by the Rams after one season in an apparent salary cap move. He was productive in his lone season with Los Angeles, tallying eight sacks in 13 games for his highest total since 2014. Matthews also did so while playing predominantly at inside linebacker, which remains an area of concern for Green Bay even after the signing of Christian Kirksey earlier this offseason.

A return to the Packers may go better than the final years of Matthews' first stint in Green Bay for a couple reasons.

First, any deal he would sign at 34 with his injury history would likely be team-friendly, making it a low-risk investment for a player with familiarity with the Packers' system. Also, with the added presences of Preston Smith, Za'Darius Smith and Kirksey, the Packers won't be relying on Matthews to be an every-down player. Matthews also saw two productive seasons in 2014 and 2015 when he made his first switch to inside backer, and the Packers' rushing defense also improved in part as a result. Green Bay is looking for patchwork to solidify their run defense once again after being gashed in the NFC Championship game against the 49ers, and Matthews might just be a helpful piece.

Daniels was also let go amid injury concerns after the 2018 season, in which he competed in just over half of the team's games. It was a far cry from his 2017 Pro Bowl year, in which he matched a career high in tackles with 49 and tallied five sacks. Injury certainly affected his explosiveness in pass rushing, as he was held to a six-year low in QB hits in his final season with Green Bay.

Detroit picked him up for 2019, but saw Daniels' least effective season yet as injuries hampered him yet again. He played in nine games and started two, while tallying a mere one sack and 10 total tackles. When healthy however, Daniels proved to be a tenacious run defender that Green Bay sorely missed along the defensive front last year.

In a recent interview with SiriusXM NFL Radio, Daniels said "I'd definitely love to go back to Green Bay," so the desire for a reunion is at least apparent from one end of the equation.

Daniels and Matthews were both cap casualties last offseason, but both they and the Packers would admit they each have something left in the tank. The familiarity both have with Green Bay's system, the leadership as veterans they can both provide and the ability to bring them back on low-risk deals make this at least worth a shot for GM Brian Gutekunst.

The actual annual average flow for 2019 was 0.019 MGD. The plant consists of a primary clarifier, RBC, unit final clarifier, anaerobic sludge digester, and a chlorination/dechlorination disinfection system. The sludge generated is anaerobically digested in sludge storage tanks then hauled to be land applied on department approved sites. Changes proposed for this issuance include 1.) addition of 2 Acute WET tests during the permit term, 2.) addition of effluent total nitrogen series monitoring, 3.) lower effluent phosphorus interim limits associated with an approved multi-discharger variance for phosphorus (MDV) and compliance schedules to comply with S. 283.18, Wis. Stats. requirements for phosphorus, 4.) fecal coliform monitoring and limits will be replaced with Escherichia coli (E. coli) monitoring and limits, as well as a compliance schedule added to specify the transition to the new limits required in S. NR 210.06(2), Wis. Adm. Code, and 5.) addition of weekly and monthly average effluent limits for ammonia.
